Upon completion of this course the student will be able to:

- 1. Examine core concepts and theory within the blended and diverging connections of film and video, both within a general historical context and as contemporary art form.
- 2. Explore and discuss moving images in relation to time, movement, capture systems and viewing methodologies, such as installation, theatre and the World Wide Web.
- 3. Examine and apply the basic technical skills required to operate digital cameras (SD, HD video cameras and DSLR's) and post-production programs (editing).
- 4. Demonstrate an understanding of the fundamental conceptual, formal and technical aspects of digital video art in the 21st century, through technical exercises and thematic projects.
- 5. Evaluate and generate constructive and interculturally aware critiques of one's own and others' projects.
- 6. Demonstrate thoughtfulness and confidence when consuming, creating and critiquing the work of others and their own.

Temporary Grade	Description	
I	Incomplete: A temporary grade assigned when the requirements of a course have not yet been completed due to hardship or extenuating circumstances, such as illness or death in the family.	
IP	<i>In progress</i> : A temporary grade assigned for courses that are designed to have an anticipated enrollment that extends beyond one term. No more than two IP grades will be assigned for the same course.	
CW	Compulsory Withdrawal: A temporary grade assigned by a Dean when an instructor, after documenting the prescriptive strategies applied and consulting with peers, deems that a student is unsafe to self or others and must be removed from the lab, practicum, worksite, or field placement.
