2. Intended Learning Outcomes

Upon completion of this course the student will be able to:

1. Reading and Writing

- Analyze literature in English written in genres of poetry, short fiction, novel, and drama from different historical periods;
- Analyze literature in English by authors from various cultural backgrounds;
- Identify different literary forms and genres;
- Acquire a working vocabulary of literary critical terminology;
- · Recognize literary forms, and make linkages between forms and content;
- Make, support and evaluate inferences about the function of specific literary elements;
- Develop formal/informal, critical, reflective and personal responses to texts;
- Use literary and analytical terms correctly, e.g, metaphor, irony, character, setting, and plot;
- Compare and contrast themes and issues;
- Develop appropriate interpretive skills where non-print kinds of texts are studies (film, visual, audio, digital, multi-media).
- Demonstrate the difference between paraphrase and analysis.
- Develop and argue, in an academic essay format, a coherent reading of a literary text;
- · Select and integrate primary textual evidence that effectively supports an essay's argument;
- Integrate secondary sources where applicable;
- Use a scholarly essay form, including a thesis; topic sentences; argument and/or analysis; use of quotations; unified, coherent paragraphs and transitions; rhetorical strategies appropriate for purpose and audience; effective introductions and conclusions;
- Use a critical approach with appropriate language and terminology;
- Produce writing under exam or exam-like conditions;

- Write clear, concise, effective prose, and know how to identify, as well as correct common mechanical and grammatical errors.
- 2. Information Literacy Skills:
 - Determine the nature and extent of the information needed.
 - Know and use what information resources available, in different formats.
 - Use print and electronic resources effectively and efficiently.
 - Evaluate sources for authority, relevance, reliability, currency and other criteria.
 - Incorporate and integrate research through correct use of summary, paraphrase and quotation.
 - Document sources fully and ethically, according to specified bibliographic conventions.
- 3. Discussion/Reflection:
 - Discuss and analyze literature in class;
 - Identify a variety of literary approaches and/or theories that can be taken towards a text;
 - Articulate one's position in a critical debate of ideas.
 - Engage respectfully with different interpretations.
 - Reflect on one's own writing for continuous improvement.

4. Course Schedule (Sept. 8 to Dec. 10)

This course is offered online through D2L, which means that, for the most part, you will learn asynchronously (on your own time). I will be readily available for consultation, and to support your learning.

Regular L I V E, synchronous sessions will be scheduled at the beginning of each new module to clarify assignments, discuss selected texts, and answer your questions. Attendance at these live, recorded sessions is optional. They are designed to keep you connected, improve your mark, and to save you time--*join the conversations when you can!* The schedule for L I V E sessions can be found on the "Class Schedule."

To support your learning, here is the rhythm of postings:

- 1. Each week, I will upload videos, PowerPoints/lectures, activities and other links/materials that guide you through the different literary genres, terms, texts, and themes that we are studying. Always start with "Instructions for the Week".
- 2. "Rocking Chair Chats," hosted by myself and other guests, will offer discussions some of the works to provide more context and insight into the readings.
- 3. Occasionally, I will post short videos that delve into writing practices that you will need for your assignments. Doing the readings, reviewing the materials, and applying feedback on your written assignments will deeply enrich your learning.

Poem or Short Story Analysis	Short critical analysis examining the use of poetic and/or narrative form; interpretation of figurative imagery;	10%
Drama Response	correct use of literary terminology; support of thesis Analysis of two performance elements from Stratford production of <i>Hamlet</i> or film adaptation that effectively shape and interpret the script; summary; comparison and contrast; correct use of literary terms	15%
Novel Project	Presentation of your interpretation of your novel through an alternate medium or an original artwork (many options are available); exploration of ideas for novel essay; paraphrase vs. analysis; mixed mode presentation skills	10%
Novel Essay	6-page essay demonstrating literary analysis; use of limited secondary sources; integration of textual evidence and research (summary, paraphrase, direct quotation); summary, correct use of literary terms	
Discussion Forum Participation (3)	Post of three well-developed responses to questions on readings; peer commentary; understanding and engaging with different interpretations of texts	15%
Quizzes (5)	Five quizzes – reading comprehension; drawing inferences; self-reflection; correct use of literary terms	10%
Final Exam (online, scheduled during final exam period; 24-hour completion requirement)	Reading comprehension (short answer); comparison and inferences; critical literary analysis using correct terms	25%

This course is a safe, inclusive, and respectful space. Interpreting literature is a personal experience. If you find that any works or discussion comments trigger you, please let me know so that you can be well supported.

This course involves intensive reading, deep thinking, and self-reflection. While you read, record your own observations and insights. Literature is the training ground for human subjectivity that invites personal transformation and growth. Tale the time to work through the readings, discovering what is relevant to you and your own life.

Participation opens us to consider different views that enrich our self-understanding. Becoming comfortable at sharing your own views and learning from others benefits your own learning and communication skills. Become curious and always ask questions to develop your critical thinking skills.

Complete all assignments by the deadlines. Deadlines are put in place to help you move through the class smoothly and at a regular pace. However, it is true that "life happens." Therefore, one late

assignment will be permitted, and must be submitted before the last class. Late assignments will not receive commentary. If you have trouble submitting any other assignments on time, please contact me.

Submission of assignments. Please submit assignments on D2L as MicroSoft Word documents (not PDFs) by NOON, 12:00pm (Pacific / B.C. time) on the due dates.

Plagiarism is the submission of work that is not your own, and/or that does not appropriately document original sources. Having someone else write all or part of your assignment is also plagiarism. B. Temporary Grades

Temporary Grade	Description
I	<i>Incomplete</i> : A temporary grade assigned when the requirements of a course have not yet been completed due to hardship or extenuating circumstances, such as illness or death in the family.
IP	<i>In progress</i> : A temporary grade assigned for courses that are designed to have an anticipated enrollment that extends beyond one term. No more than two IP grades will be assigned for the same course.
CW	<i>Compulsory Withdrawal</i> : A temporary grade assigned by a Dean when an instructor, after documenting the prescriptive strategies applied and consulting with peers, deems that a student is unsafe to self or others and must be removed from the lab, practicum, worksite, or field placement.
