- 5. Critically review and assess quality in live and recorded musical performances in jazz idiom.

4. Course Content and Schedule

5. Basis of Student Assessment (Weighting)

- (a) Term Paper 30 marks (choose an artist from a discussion with your instructor), 3000 words. Cite the background and influences, the style of jazz they play and their education and experience. Describe their contribution to the art form and significance of their work as well as social and historical context. Include discography and bibliography.
 - Due on Wednesday, October 28, 2020.
- (b) In Class Mini Presentations- 4 X 10 each = 40 marks Topics TBA. Students will be assigned innovators in the jazz world to research and present to the class with examples of their music and stories of their early life, social and historical context and career development. These should be roughly 20 minutes long.
- (c) Live Stream Gig- 10 marks.
 - Students will be required to choose a livestream jazz gig of their own choosing and report on the musicianship, style and repertoire of the performance. In addition two songs should be featured in follow up research considering whom the composer was/is and what famous recording featured that song. This is a written report that should be roughly 750-1000 words and is due on Thursday November 26th.
- (d) There will be a listening and terminology exam on December 10th in class 20 marks
