- Debate canon formation and challenges to the canon;
- Use critical, literary terminology;
- Use a critical approach with appropriate language and terminology;
- Argue for various interpretations;
- Evaluate specific literary techniques;
- Employ close reading and argumentation skills;
- Use a scholarly essay form, including: a thesis; topic sentences; argument and/or analysis; use of quotations; unified, coherent paragraphs and transitions; rhetorical strategies appropriate for purpose and audience; effective introductions and conclusions;
- Produce writing under exam or exam-like conditions;
- Write clear, concise, effective prose, and know how to identify as well as correct common mechanical and grammatical errors.
- Evaluate secondary sources and integrate where applicable;
- Write persuasive arguments in scholarly, academic essay format, using MLA documentation.

2. Information Literacy Skills:

- Determine the nature and extent of the information needed.
- Know and use what information resources are available, in different formats.
- Use print and electronic resources effectively and efficiently.
- Evaluate sources for authority, relevance, reliability, currency and other criteria.
- Incorporate and integrate research through correct use of summary, paraphrase and quotation.
- Document sources fully and ethically, according to specified bibliographic conventions.

3. Discussion/Reflection:

- Discuss and analyze literature in class;

COURSE GUIDELINES & EXPECTATIONS

- All readings must be completed **before the class assigned to them**. Bring the readings with you to the learning sessions.
- **Participation is worth a hefty 10%**, so please bring your brilliant ideas and observations to our online sessions and to the weekly discussion boards too. Attending class, preparing well, and bringing an inquisitive, generous, and energetic spirit not only shows all of us you respect the learning environment, but it will also put you in a great position to succeed on the assignments. This will be the easiest 10% you make all year so make the most of it.

- **Start working right away.** Life comes at you fast. And by life, I mean deadlines. Don't procrastinate, do the readings and don't underestimate how long an assignment will take. If you get a disappointing grade on an early assignment, make adjustments – don't assume the same level of work will get you a better mark later.
- **Deadlines:** Deadlines are organized to facilitate marking and returning papers in a timely manner, and to give you the greatest benefit from feedback for future assignments. They also establish that I am a human, with a life, and give me some surety around which I may organize this life.

Late assignments will be docked a 5% per day penalty. However, **you have a one-time amnesty for a single take-home assignment.** This is to recognize that you, too, are humans with lives, and that sometimes those get in the way of coursework. I want to give you the best chance to succeed in the course, but please respect the above. **You must let me know in advance of the deadline that an assignment will be late.**
