COURSE GUIDELINES & EXPECTATIONS

<u>Class Community</u> This grade reflects that students are expected to keep up with the course work and participate in the discussion forums. When everyone does the readings, and quizzes, and watches the videos and takes some time to think about what we are studying, the quality of the discussion is elevated. Regard the discussions as professional work; this means no slang, no swearing, best efforts for correct grammar and spelling. I trust we will all aim to write as if we are speaking face to face, where dignity, courtesy and respect are constantly mandatory.

<u>Weekly Homework Quizzes</u>: There is a homework quiz set up on D2L for each chapter of the text. The weekly quiz always opens on a Wednesday at noon, and closes at noon the following Wednesday. Students may write the quiz at any time during the week; so extensions to complete these quizzes, unless they are made in advance, will not be granted.

The quizzes are set up to allow two attempts. After the first attempt, the D2L quiz tool will show which answers are incorrect. This gives students a chance to correct their mistakes. Only the higher of the two scores will count towards the homework grade. However, the quizzes also include the task of writing arguments. The great variety of possible correct answers makes it impossible for the computer to mark them automatically; so, the program will initially count these as incorrect. I have scheduled logic homework marking for Wednesday -Thursday afternoons. The grades will be sent out to students as the marking is completed.

The practice questions in the text, the quiz questions, and the questions that will appear tests are consistent in style and content. This way, to complete a quiz is to study for the test.

First Test, On Chapters 1, 2, 3, and 4

The test will open on D2L on Wednesday October 13th at 12 pm and close on Friday October 15th at 12:00 p.m. This is a one hour test that students may complete the test at anytime during this 48 hour window.

Second Test, On Chapters 5, 6, 7, and 8

The test will open on D2L on Wednesday November 10th at 12 pm and close on Saturday November 13th at 12:00 p.m. This is a one hour test that students may complete the test at anytime during this 72 hour window. (November 11th is a holiday; this schedule gives 48 non-holiday hours for the test.)

Final Test, On Chapters 9, 10, 11 and 12

The final test is scheduled during the first week of final exams. The test will open on D2L on Monday December 13th 12 pm and close on Wednesday Wednesday December 15th st at 12 p.m. This is a one hour test that students may complete the test at anytime during this 48 hour window.
