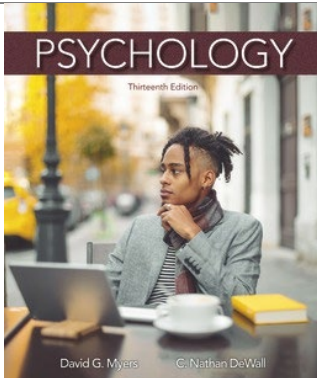

BREAKDOWN OF STUDENT ASSESSMENT

Exams (Exam 1 – 15%; Exam 2 – 20%; Exam 3 – 15%)

You will write three in-class exams. Exams are non-cumulative which means they will only cover material since the previous exam. All course material is testable (lectures, textbook chapters, supplementary materials). The format of all three exams will be multiple choice and short answer and will take place during class time.

What to do if I miss an exam due to illness?

Chapter Quizzes (best 6 of 8) = 12% of final grade

Quizzes will be offered at the end of each chapter (see Course Schedule for dates) and are meant to assess your understanding of the course material. These quizzes will also help prepare you for the format of the exams. **All quizzes will be completed on your own time.** Please note that **no makeup quizzes will be provided.** If you miss a quiz (including due to illness), it will be one of the 2 lowest grades dropped from your final mark. All quizzes are timed will be offered online through D2L and will consist of multiple-choice questions. Additional information will be provided in-class and on D2L.

What if I have technical issues logging on or completing the quiz?

Participation (best 16 of 20) = 8% of final grade

Most participation activities will be completed **in class**, though occasionally there will participation activities offered on D2L. These participation activities are intended to reinforce the lecture material, provide interactive examples of concepts, and allow students to connect to the material through personal experience. All participation activities are graded as complete/incomplete and no makeup participation points will be provided. Additional information on participation points will be provided in class.

Individual Written Assignment (IWA) = 30% of final grade

Students will be asked to debunk a common psychological myth by reading and writing about psychological research on that topic. The individual written assignment will be broken down into the following smaller components:

Identification of article/APA formatting – 5% (due Mon Sept 20)

Article summary – 5% (due Mon Oct 4)

Critical thinking component – 5% (due Mon Nov 8)

Final copy of paper – 15% (due Mon Dec 13)

All assignments are due by 10pm on the due date and are to be uploaded directly to D2L (no paper copies accepted).

IWA Late Policy

Students are responsible for uploading assignments to D2L before the deadline. Assignments will lose 5% for each 12 hours that they are late, to a maximum of 40%. After that, the grade will be assigned as a 0%.

Additional information on the Individual Written Assignment, including details of each smaller component and relevant materials, will be posted on D2L under the “Assignment” section and will be highlighted in class.

- I will give and receive feedback. I will provide written feedback on the IWA components and am happy to meet with you to discuss the feedback. I'm also open to receiving constructive feedback about your experiences within the course.

What I Expect from Students

The main expectation I have of students is that you dedicate time to this course. This can be done in a number of ways:

- Attend all class sessions when possible (but please do not attend class if you are ill)
- Manage your time → dedicate time to course readings, studying, and assignments
- Check the D2L page often → all course materials will be provided on D2L
- Provide constructive feedback → let me know if certain formats are not working well for you, if you're interested in certain topics, or if you're not interested in some topics
- Let me know if you have any special circumstances → we all learn in different ways and with varying degrees of success. If you find that you are struggling in the course, contact me and we can work towards a solution.
- Conduct yourself appropriately during class → this includes listening to and interacting with others in a respectful manner. We are all very diverse and have different values, beliefs, and opinions. Within this course, we will aim to approach topics in psychology with a scientific, critical mind.
