COURSE OUTLINE

This course is an introduction to drawing: exploring objective, subjective, and conceptual approaches using a variety of materials and tools such as graphite, ink, charcoal, chalk, and digital technologies. Students will learn about the elements of art and how these are used in formal and informal structures such as observational drawing, perspective rendering, and visualizing conceptual ideas.

2. Intended Learning Outcomes

Upon completion of this course the student will be able to:

- 1. Draw with an understanding of line, shape, form, space, colour and texture.
- 2. Visually distinguish and describe space two-dimensionally, for example, through drawing techniques such as linear or atmospheric perspective.
- 3. Observe, interpret and represent objects two-dimensionally.
- 4. Give form to illustrative, subjective, conceptual and abstract ideas.
- 5. Evaluate and generate constructive and interculturally aware critiques of one's own and others' projects.

6. Describe historical and contemporary references.

3. Required Materials

- (b) Students are expected to bring the items listed below to each class.
 - Apron or work-shirt
 - Blending stomp: small
 - Chinese brushes for use with ink: 1 S, 1 M or L
 - Chinese ink: small bottle
 - o Charcoal
 - Compressed sticks 3 black (or set of 6)
 - Vine stick: 3 black (or a set)
 - o Conté crayons: set of 4, 1 each black, sanguine, grey, white
 - Erasers 1 each: kneadable, plastic
 - Glue stick: 40 grams
 - Masking tape 1 inch wide
 - o Drawing pens
 - o Fine tipped technical drawing & brush pen like the Tombow Dual Brush Pen, N25, Black
 - Micron pen: 3 in black and optional in different colours e.g. sepia
 - Pad of 18x24 inches newsprint paper (for protecting work and for test drawings)
 - Pencils: Set of 6-12 sketching/drawing soft pencils
 - $\circ \quad \text{Scissors}$
 - o Sketchbook. 9 x 12 inches is popular. No smaller. Keep this separate from other courses
 - Ruler: 24 inch or Metre stick
 - Utility knife with snap-off blade
 - Long, thin, strong stick such as bamboo, 36 inches or 1 metre long (you can get these at the hardware store or garden centre)
 - o Tool box: shoe box, plastic bin, hardware, fishing for all your supplies

Optional

- Colour medium of your choice (1 set of 12): e.g. chalk pastels, pencil crayons, brush pens or micron pens
- Ink drawing pen and nibs: 1 fine, 1 coarse
- Bulldog clips: 2 (holds sheets of paper to drawing boards)
- Drawing board

Later in the course as you gain experience, you will to pick up either

- Canson or Vellum-like paper
- Water colour paper etc. depending on the needs of your project

B. Temporary Grades

Temporary grades are assigned for specific circumstances and will convert to a final grade according to the grading scheme being used in the course. Temporary Grade	Description
I	<i>Incomplete</i> : A temporary grade assigned when the requirements of a course have not yet been completed due to hardship or extenuating circumstances, such as illness or death in the family.
IP	<i>In progress</i> : A temporary grade assigned for courses that are designed to have an anticipated enrollment that extends beyond one term. No more than two IP grades will be assigned for the same course.
CW	<i>Compulsory Withdrawal</i> : A temporary grade assigned by a Dean when an instructor, after documenting the prescriptive strategies applied and consulting with peers, deems that a student is unsafe to self or others and must be removed from the lab, practicum, worksite, or field placement.
