Intended learning outcomes; upon completion of this course the student will be able to:

- 1. Describe the key art movements and artists in the growth of modern art beginning c. 1750.
- 2. Describe the techniques, processes and theories of modern art making.
- 3. Discuss the relationship between art and social change.

Required materials

- **Computer—with video and microphone capabilities.** We will be using a Collaborate (located in D2L) to teleconference. A computer with a webcam or built in camera and audio allows students to connect in real time with me and others in the class. If you are using older technology, a cost effective solution.is to purchase a webcam that also has a built-in mic (it connects to a desktop computer via a USB cable).
- Reliable internet; additionally, for best audio, use Chrome or Safari as your browser.

Required materials, cont.

- Collaborate uses **a lot of data**. Your internet data usage will increase from working online so students are encouraged to budget accordingly and consult with their internet provider to ensure they have adequate data. Or find other ways to have adequate (and affordable) coverage for the semester.


Welcome to the *fascinating* world of art history! This course explores Western art and architecture beginning c. 1750 and moving chronologically to contemporary art and architecture. We begin by examining the artistic traditions inherited from the Renaissance in order to understand what Modern artists were rebelling against; next, we examine Modern art, and we conclude the semester by looking at the Postmodern era to see the shift in thinking and art making that ushered in a new era. Although this course has been articulated to focus on the West, there will be discussions that incorporate a more global and diverse approach.

As it is clearly impossible to cover all countries, art historical periods, artists, and artistic mediums, only a select few artists and ideas will be explored. The artistic legacies we do investigate will be considered and discussed according to their meaning(s) and function(s) in relation to the specific society and/or culture that produced the art.

Course delivery: using a flipped classroom approach

- This course uses a **flipped class approach**, that is, students encounter material before coming to class in the pre-class assignments.
- Expect pre-class work to be around 30 minutes to 1 hour (or more) per lecture; it includes readings, research, short assignments, watching YouTube clips or videos I create. It is **vital** that all pre-class work is done before coming to class since this knowledge will be assumed. During lecture time (on Collaborate) I build and elaborate upon that information.
- The material learned is put into practice as homework in study guide assignments. Each class has homework. These assignments are not reviewed or graded by the instructor; rather, they are to assist students to synthesize information and prepare for the exams.

EXAMS

- The exams will be **synchronous**, that is, everyone will write the exam on the same day and at the same time.
- Exams are online quizzes (through D2L).
- Exams are based on a pre-class work, lectures, and homework, as well as conducting additional research. Something from every lecture is on the exam.
- An exam overview will be available ahead of time to assist your exam preparations.
- The exams will include (but not be limited to) true and false, multiple choice, and image analysis (written responses). There are no re-writes for the exam.

Missed exams. If a student misses an exam due to illness or extenuating circumstances, notify me <u>immediately</u> by email with the reason for your absence. You may be required to provide certifiable documentation for missing the exam before the exam can be rescheduled. The rescheduled exam will be different from the initial exam.

ACADEMIC RESEARCH PROJECT: ESSAY

- o Students will be researching and writing an academic research paper on a specific topic.
- The essay will be 2,000 words of essay text (plus a title page, images, and bibliography); it will adhere to the format, formalities, and language of academic papers.
- To assist students with this project, small assignments will be given to provide instruction and direction, but most assignments will not be graded.
- Library sessions will be available to assist with the research process.
- I assume that students have not written a paper of this length so I will walk everyone through the process.

No extensions will be granted for the final essay date unless extenuating circumstances arise

Academic consequences if source material is not cited.

Not citing your sources using is a form of plagiarism and, therefore, cannot be graded. If you are not sure about when and how to cite your sources, consult your *Style Manual*. The <u>Arts & Science's Academic Honesty Guidelines</u> defines plagiarism and the range of actions taken. It is the **student's responsibility** to become familiar with the content of these guidelines and abide by them.

requesting an extension for the library assignment

If you require an extension, this is the procedure: at least 24 hours (or more) before the due date, send an email for the extension. I do not give extensions on the day the assignment is due.

In the email you must:

- 1) tell me **why** you need the extension (extenuating circumstances); Extenuating circumstances **do not include** having other assignments to complete the same time my assignment was due; or having to go to your job/work.
- 2) indicate where you are in the assignment (how much is already completed: email me what you have)
- 3) indicate how much more time is needed to complete the assignment (propose a **new due date**)
- 4) I will assess the above information and either grant—or not grant--an extension

Penalty for late submission of the library assignment

-Late assignments will be penalized 5% per day (including weekends)

-the penalty will be taken off the final grade of the assignment

-Assignments will not be accepted 5 calendar days after due date
