- 2. Write and reason with clarity and precision.
- 3. Detect bias and fallacious reasoning in arguments.
- 4. Apply basic logical principles to the evaluation of evidence and the conducting of inquiry.

4. Course Content and Schedule

This will be an *asynchronous* online course, with an additional *synchronous* element. This means that there are no particular times of day when you need to watch course videos or complete your assigned work. There are still regular deadlines for completing assignments, so you will be expected to keep up with what we are covering in any given week.

The *synchronous* element of this course is as follows: every **Monday and Wednesday, from 10:00am-11:30am**, I will host an online seminar using the Collaborate tool on D2L. In each seminar we will go over practice questions from the previous lecture(s). I will have a bank of practice questions that we can work through, but students are also encouraged to show up with their own questions. This part of the course is technically optional—participation in the online seminars doesn't

count towards your final grade—but you are *highly encouraged* to take advantage of them. **Reading** the assigned chapter is essential preparation for attending online seminars.

Course videos will be captioned, and I will try to fix any errors in the automatic transcriptions, but please feel free to email me if you notice any remaining mistakes. If you notice any additional accessibility issues with respect to this class, please let me know and I will do my best to solve them. I would also encourage any students who might benefit from their services to consult the Centre for Accessible Learning (http://camosun.ca/services/accessible-learning/).

You are welcome and encouraged to discuss course material with others in your class, and work together to solve problems. However, the work you turn in must be your own.
