2. Intended Learning Outcomes

Upon completion of this course the student will be able to:

- 1. Write poems that are well-crafted.
- 2. Identify the writing techniques used in the crafting of a poem.
- 3. Develop a writing process using journaling, free-association exercises, drafting, work-shopping, revising, and editing/proofing.
- 4. Vary poetic style purposefully using concrete and abstract language, structure, point of view, syntax, rhythm, sound, image, and metaphor.
- 5. Use a variety of poetic strategies including the lyric and the narrative.
- 6. Use a variety of forms including fixed forms, blank verse, and free verse.
- 7. Read diverse, established poets to identify their poetics.
- 8. Read their own poetry to an audience of peers.
- 9. Identify the process and avenues for poetry submission.

4. Course Content and Schedule

The course uses *Writing and Workshopping Poetry: A Constructive Introduction* as a guide. Each week, we will focus on particular poems included in the book, and I'll let you know which ones in advance. You will also be given exercises and prompts for creating poems. You will be organized into small workshopping groups, and each group will need to devise a system (such as email or Zoom or both) for discussing the poems of the group. The workload of the courses includes the following: reading the chapters as assigned in the text, focusing on specific poems in the text, responding to prompts, doing exercises, writing poems, reading and commenting on other students' poems, learning terminology and techniques, participating in the synchronous class time (Tuesdays 1-2:20 pm local time at Camosun), writing a quiz, and other small tasks as necessary.

5. Basis of Student Assessment (Weighting)

60% poems (10-12 over the course, about one per week, specific guidelines to come)

10% commentaries on poems (from workshopping, details to follow)

10% participation in online discussion (Tuesdays, 1-2:20 pm local time at Camosun, details to follow)

10% postings on poems (from textbook, details to follow)

10% quiz on vocabulary and identification of techniques (April 12, 1-2:20 pm local time at Camosun)

B. Temporary Grades

Temporary Grade	Description
I	Incomplete: A temporary grade assigned when the requirements of a course have not yet been completed due to hardship or extenuating circumstances, such as illness or death in the family.
IP	<i>In progress</i> : A temporary grade assigned for courses that are designed to have an anticipated enrollment that extends beyond one term. No more than two IP grades will be assigned for the same course.
CW	Compulsory Withdrawal: A temporary grade assigned by a Dean when an instructor, after documenting the prescriptive strategies applied and consulting with peers, deems that a student is unsafe to self or others and must be removed from the lab, practicum, worksite, or field placement.
