Learning language is over all to interact with one another, to learn cultures. Active participation and active learning are very important to students' own learning and intercultural knowledge. Learning French offers opportunities, professional as personal ones. As the second language in Canada, French would give you access to federal and provincial employment or any other areas where bilingualism is required in or outside the country, as international organizations (e.g. UN).

French represents 300 million of francophones on five continents and used as a daily life language, mostly in Africa (59%), or as a second or foreigner language. It is the second language learned each year by over 132 million of people after English. French is an international language that is also largely used on Internet. In French 106, students will discover different aspects of *la francophonie*. They will practice the four proficiencies: writing, reading, speaking, and listening by developing strategies for writing, editing/reviewing and reading texts, and oral communication. It is important that students question themselves on strategies they use in order to reach their objectives with more effectiveness.

5. Basis of Student Assessment (Weighting)

Online Course Structure

The first part of the course* (1:30 - 2:45 pm), **that is mandatory**, on Blackboard Collaborate Ultra (BBCU) is dedicated to the presentation and explanation of the topics by the teacher and **by the students**. Students will have to prepare one week in advance the topics that will be discussed the following week in class. They will have to read the documents before class, summarize their reading in class, and prepare their questions to ask the teacher and colleagues. In this way, the more students are prepared, the more attention can be given to practice and understanding of the content for each and everyone.

During the second part of the course* (2:45 -3:20 pm), **that is nonmandatory**, on BBCU, students will practice oral communication. It is strongly advised to practice also outside of class hours the four proficiencies. Reading theory and practice of oral exercises (listening and speaking) and written exercises (reading and writing) are very important in learning a language. It is strongly advised to study an average of 4 hours per week.

^{*} Please note that the duration of the two parts of the course may vary depending on the topics.

Projects (2): Listening, Reading, and Writing (20%+20%)

Learning a language is based on practice, which means on repetition of the subjects learned and learning new subjects and so on. The French course FREN 106-D01 aims above all to give students the chance to practice and improve their skills. The course therefore focuses on self-learning and self-assessment, but also on feedback from the teacher. For this reason, the four competencies will be assessed through cumulative projects. Each new project contains some of the topics from the previous project because the final objective is to be able to understand and communicate in French.

Self-learning, self-evaluation and feedback from the teacher are essential to achieve the course objectives but more importantly to be able to communicate in French in real-life situations. These two projects (listening, reading, and writing) must be completed, out of online class, by the due date at the beginning of each online class. Late submissions, including during and after online class, will lose 5% per day unless accompanied by a legitimate reason (see below). Projects more than five days late (including weekends) will no longer be accepted, and then no marked. Please note, again, that these projects are based on self-learning and self-evaluation (e.g. correction, personal feedback): students will have access to the answer keys for the two projects, except some exercises in the reading and writing parts. Teacher will give marks on the quality of the self-evaluation and the exercises with no answer keys. For instance, did the students forget some of their mistakes even when checking with the answer keys? Did they copy answers from the answer keys? How is the personal feedback? etc

Oral: Reading (10%)

Students will be required to read text(s) in order to revise (FREN-105) basic phonetic notions such as intonation, rhythm, links, pronunciation, especially French vowels. This reading also serves as practice for online oral presentation or podcasting.

Short Oral Presentations (1): Francophonie (10%)

Students will have to explain their choice on two works (books, movies, songs) from the French-speaking world. Students will have to choose one work from the list of French documents in the library created by the professor and one work from the "La francophonie" section of chapters 1, 2 or 3 of the textbook. As there are three presentation dates, the students' presentations will be divided among these three dates. For the presentation, students will have to write their transcript in a discussion forum, but only the 2-minute oral presentation will be evaluated.

The aim of this oral is also to learn that communicating in another language does not require perfect pronunciation, perfect performance, but to be able to transmit one's ideas and opinions on a given subject despite language errors while specifying that the message must be orally understood.

PodCast* or Online Oral Presentation (35%: 4 steps: 5%+10%+5%+15%)

*Podcast is "balado" in French.

Podcast / Balado

Students will prepare alone or in a group of two a "balado-blogue" (podcast-blog) of one aspect of *la francophonie* that will be presented at the French community radio of Victoria: Radio Victoria 107.9FM. The participation to the podcasting* requires a minimum of students, otherwise this oral evaluation will be cancelled, and students instead will have to present an online oral presentation. Students have to record their podcast on a mp3 file and submit it in D2L, under Assignments. The presentation must be entirely created by the student(s) without the help of software or other persons (see Cheating and Plagiarism, page 7)

*Podcasting is "baladodiffusion" in French.

Online Oral Presentation

Students will prepare alone are in group of two an online oral presentation, a blog or a vlog (video), of one aspect of la francophonie (art, culture, events, places, etc.). Students have to record their oral presentation on a mp3 file, a Power Point, or video (mp4) and submit it in D2L, under Assignments. The presentation must be entirely created by the student(s) without the help of software or other persons (see Cheating and Plagiarism, page 7)

There are four submissions for the podcast and the online oral presentation in order to help students to be ready for the final presentation. Each submission is evaluated as follows:

- 1. **First step** of mini-conference or podcast: subject and plan (5 % on 35%)
- 2. Second step of podcast oral online presentation: correction or your plan, 1st version of your transcript and questions for another team. (10 % on 35%)
- 3. Third step of podcast or oral online presentation: correction of your 1st version of your transcript and submission of your 2nd version, correction of your questions. (5 % of 35%)
- 4. Fourth step of podcast or oral online presentation: submission of your 3rd and final version of your transcript and recordings or videos.(15% of 35%). The final evaluation includes also questions asked by the audience (students) to the conference-speakers/podcasters. Both the audience and the conference-speakers/podcasters will be evaluated. **Note**: the final presentation will be recorded for each presentation.

Objectives:

The objective of these two different activities is to encourage students' learning while expressing ideas, thoughts and preferences, and prepare them to speak in public (in class or on radio). Audience (students and teacher only) will interact with the podcasters and conference speakers (students) by asking them questions. Students will be asked to show their progress to the instructor during the term in order to receive marks and feedback on how to improve their language skills (grammar, syntax, and vocabulary) and their oral expression (pronunciation, rhythm, and intonation). It is thus important to start the preparation as early as possible in order to receive the maximum of feedback.

The assignments must be completed without any translators or proofreading (speaking) by anyone else. Work that suggests the use of external help will not be accepted. USING TRANSLATOR PROGRAMS OR HAVING ANOTHER PERSON DO YOUR HOMEWORK OR CREATE YOUR ORAL PRESENTATION CONSTITUTES CHEATING. (see Cheating and Plagiarism, page 7)

Attendance (5%)

The first part of each course is mandatory, and it is important to attend to ensure continuous learning and progress. Regular attendance at the course also ensures a minimum of online social interaction between students. Class attendance is from 10:30 to 11:45 am and counts for 5% of the final grade. The first two weeks of the course are not evaluated. From the third week on, the evaluation will be done as follows for the courses from week 3 to week 14 (24 courses):

Note: Missing an evaluation, late assignments, cheating and plagiarism

The evaluations, must be completed, out of online class, by the due date. Late submissions, including during and after online class, will lose 5% per day unless accompanied by a legitimate reason (see below). Assessments more than five days late (including weekends) will no longer be accepted, and then not marked.

The projects, oral-reading, short oral presentation, and podcast or online oral presentation must be completed without any translators or proofreading (speaking) by anyone else. Work that suggests the use of external help will not be accepted and marked 0%. Using translator programs or having another person do your assignments, your tests, or create your oral dialogues constitutes **cheating**.

Also, copying an entire assignments (including dialogues) or representing specific passages as if they are students own words is **plagiarism**. Work that suggests plagiarism will not be accepted and marked 0%.
