2. Intended Learning Outcomes

Upon completion of this course a student will be able to:

- 1. Recognize selected traits of major musical styles of the last two millennia.
- 2. Converse with assistance about select major musical styles and the musical contributors who express these styles;
- 3. Review live and recorded musical performances;
- 4. Postulate musical mechanisms which enable the effect of select music on a listener.

3. Required Materials

- (a) Internet connection or data plan sufficient to manage course materials:
 - Desire to Learn and Blackboard Collaborate ~ 4-5 hours weekly
 - YouTube and video streaming resources ~ 1-2 hours weekly
 - Audio, print, electronic-resource streaming ~ 1.5-2 hours weekly
- (b) Electronic device(s) to enable independent participation in synchronous learning (i.e. only one-person per device) and to support personal work toward the course outcomes. Your

device must be able to connect-well with the internet, and host the appropriate software and apps to enable the above platforms, as well as:

- Word-processing, including keyboard (attached or *Bluetooth*)
- Management of personal files and storage
- Basic audio-video recording (headphones, microphone, and camera)

4. Course Content and Schedule

MUSC 120 meets for synchronous learning once a week, Tuesdays, 5:30-7:00 through *Desire to Learn* (D2L) and *Blackboard Collaborate*.

Instructional videos and assigned homework for each week will be posted for Sunday at the start of each week. Instructional videos should be reviewed as much as possible prior to the Tuesday synchronous session.

In addition to 5:30-7:00 on Tuesday evenings, schedule and set aside:

- 2-2.5 hours on Sun/Mon/Tuesday to review the materials before meeting at 5:30 on Tuesday each week;
- 2-2.5 hours Wed/Th/Friday to review the materials following the meeting at 5:30 on Tuesday each week; and
- 2-2.5 hours per week to complete the homework due Wednesday 11:30 p.m. (1-1.5 hours), and Saturday noon (1-1.5 hours) each week.

- Fragile Music: Artifacts and Iconography
- Emerging West: Music in Medieval Europe

• Humanism and Reformation: Music in Renaissance Europe

• Sonorous Air, the 4th: Voices of Music

5. Basis of Student Assessment (Weighting)

(Should be directly linked to learning outcomes.)

(a) Synchronous-Session Work (10%)

Work will be completed for marks during synchronous meeting sessions. You must attend and participate in synchronous session in order to receive a mark for this in-class work. During the study week, practice samples are assigned in selected instructional video components. Practice samples are considered to be part of your in-class work.

In-class work is due as follows:

- Synchronous session: Attend and participate, weekly Tuesday 5:30-7:00
- Practice samples: weekly, Saturday, 11:30 p.m.

(b) **Homework** (50%)

Homework is assigned each week. There will be two required homework assignments, and numerous options for independent study and extra credit.

You should post your finished homework to the set D2L-dropbox for each assignment. The dropbox will close promptly at the set time and date according to Camosun's clock-timing.

Late homework (*required homework only*) may be submitted up to 2 weeks past due and will receive a 30% deduction in mark. No work – required or bonus – will be accepted once the dropbox for that assignment has closed. Further time restrictions apply for bonus work and extra credit – please see individual assignments for details.

Homework is due as follows:

- Homework #1: Due Wednesday, 11:30 p.m., each week of term
- Homework #2: Due Saturday, 12:00 noon, each week of term
- Independent study and bonus work: due as offered (never accepted for late marks)

Dropboxes close as follows:

- Dropboxes for required homework assignments will remain open up to 2 weeks past due and work will be accepted during that 2-week grace period for a 30% deduction in marks.
- Dropboxes for submitting an extension of a required homework assignment for extra credit is considered closed at the due-date and time posted for the assignment even if the dropbox remains open for late submission of the required portion of the assignment.
- Dropboxes for independent study will close at the due-date and time posted.
- All remaining open dropboxes close at noon on the last Saturday of term (prior to the final exam), and so the grace period for the final assignments of term will be shorter or non-existent.

(c) Research Project (15%)

- Research Topic: Saturday at the end of the Week 2, 11:30 p.m. (23 January 2021)
- Research Question: Saturday at the end of the Week 3, 11:30 p.m. (30 January 2021)
- Elevator Story and Preliminary Research: Saturday at the end of the Week 5, 11:30 p.m. (13 February 2021)
- Complete Research Notes and Outline/Storyboard: Saturday at the end of the Week 7, 11:30 p.m. (27 February 2021)

• Final Bibliography and completed report paper: Saturday at the end of the Week 8, 11:30 p.m. (6 March 2021)

Assignment details are posted on D2L and will be discussed at synchronous sessions.

(d) **Midterm** (10%) – 23 February 2021, 5:30-7:00

The midterm will cover ALL material covered during Weeks 1-5. A sheet for your independent review will be posted one week prior, and an extra office-hour session will be hosted just prior to the long weekend, but no formal review will be given. Your best study strategy is to review all course materials and complete all assigned work in a timely fashion, observe the details of feedback given, attend all synchronous sessions, and attend office hours when needed.

(e) **Final Examination** (15%) – Time and date set by Camosun. Expected to be 6:00-9:00, 20 April 2020

The final exam will cover ALL material covered during Weeks 6-14. A sheet for your independent review will be posted one week prior, the last synchronous session will be dedicated to review for the final, and an extra office-hour session will be hosted during the last week of term. Your best study strategy is to review all course materials and complete all assigned work in a timely fashion, observe the details of feedback given, attend all synchronous sessions, and attend office hours when needed.

IP	In progress: A temporary grade assigned for courses that are designed to have an anticipated enrollment that extends beyond one term. No more than two IP grades will be assigned for the same course.
CW	Compulsory Withdrawal: A temporary grade assigned by a Dean when an instructor, after documenting the prescriptive strategies applied and consulting with peers, deems that a student is unsafe to self or others and must be removed from the lab, practicum, worksite, or field placement.
