2. Intended Learning Outcomes:

Upon completion of this course, the student will be able to:

1. Describe major contemporary issues in psychology and explain their historical antecedents.
2. Apply psychological theories and understanding of current psychological issues to personal experience.
3. Conduct impartial studies of psychological topics and arrive at logical inferences and conclusions from collected data.

3. Course Content and Schedule

The course purpose is to learn and apply critical thinking skills to social and developmental issues. Understanding psychology as a scientific study of human behavior and mental processes is the main emphasis. Some topics examined are: lifespan development, health psychology, intelligence, social influences, social cognition, and psychological disorders and treatments.

Final examination: all chapters. **Total worth 25% of course grade. Date April 19-27**

Material is based on textbook readings and notes. Final exam comprises **139** multiple choice questions on all chapters covered throughout the course. The questions are similar to the chapter reviews.

Discussion Posts: Chapters 10, 05, 12, and 15. **Each post is 5% for a total worth 20% of course grade.** Creating threads on four discussion postings.

ONE Assignment to choose from THREE TOPICS:

Chapters 10, 15, and 16. **Total worth 15% of course grade.**

There are three topics of which **students are responsible for one**. Topic one or topic two maybe **completed with a partner**. Deciding to work in partnership with another student means agreeing to receive the same grade. The third topic is **an individual reflection paper** on a psychological disorder, either a recent or a past diagnosis and treatment.

Eight Chapter Reviews: Online chapter reviews of 5% are scheduled. **Total worth 40% of course.** Each review comprises 17 multiple-choice questions and one short essay for 3 points for total of 20 points. The purpose of these reviews is for Students' to remain current with textbook reading and course materials. There are eight chapter reviews on D2L found in my tools, under quizzes. Each chapter review is worth 5% for 40% of course grade. **The chapter review is available on Thursdays' access starts at 8:00 am and ends at 4:30am. There is 30 to complete 17 multiple choice questions and one short answer.**

Accessing Quizzes

Step-by-Step Guide for Student Access to Quizzes/Chapter Reviews on D2L:

1. Login to course D2L Website.
2. Select **Quizzes** from the navigation bar.
3. Scroll down to **Current Quizzes**.
4. Click the link for the quiz you need to complete.
5. Scroll down to the bottom of the page and click **Start Quiz**.
6. Select the correct response for each question in the quiz (Your responses will automatically be saved).
7. Once you have answered all the questions, scroll to the bottom of the page and click **Submit Quiz**.
8. D2L will prompt you to return to questions that you may have missed or have not yet answered. You may have to click the **Submit Quiz** button again.
9. Wait for confirmation that the quiz was submitted before closing the browser window/tab. You will receive a message "Your quiz has been submitted successfully."

STUDENT STUDY TECHNIQUES RECOMMENDED WORKING THROUGH THE COURSE:

1. **Survey:** Scan chapter titles, subtitles, and chapter summary before reading the chapter
2. **Question:** formulate questions from the textbook, partial notes using headings and subheadings. Use on line glossary and flash cards to define terminology and concepts
3. **Print off chapter questions on d2L and answer these as the chapter is read.**
4. **Read:** be sure to read theories and concepts to compare and contrast similarities and differences between the bio-psychosocial perspectives. An example, how does psychoanalytic theory compare to the cognitive social learning theory? Keep your questions in mind and do not skip graphs, boxes, tables etc. Following reading and completing chapter questions, check your answers against the chapter answers posted. Listen to pre-audio recordings and watch videos listed in D2L on each of the chapters assigned.
5. **Retrieve:** prepare questions on the material than email questions or meet online in collaborate to discuss.
6. **Launchpad:** is an online interactive study tool for students to work through at their own pace.
7. **Review:** Create a summary covering all your questions and answers and list all the key terms and operationally define them.

8. **Read:** the chapter a second time, for any missed detail in order to apply your conceptual understanding using examples in preparation for exams, assignment, and discussion posts.

Temporary Grade	Description
I	<i>Incomplete:</i> A temporary grade assigned when the requirements of a course have not yet been completed due to hardship or extenuating circumstances, such as illness or death in the family.
IP	<i>In progress:</i> A temporary grade assigned for courses that are designed to have an anticipated enrollment that extends beyond one term. No more than two IP grades will be assigned for the same course.
CW	<i>Compulsory Withdrawal:</i> A temporary grade assigned by a Dean when an instructor, after documenting the prescriptive strategies applied and consulting with peers, deems that a student is unsafe to self or others and must be removed from the lab, practicum, worksite, or field placement.
