# 2. Intended Learning Outcomes

Upon completion of this course a student will be able to:

- 1. Identify key concepts describing interpersonal communication.
- 2. Describe basic principles and theories of communication.
- 3. Analyze personal life events using course vocabulary, concepts and theory.
- 4. Demonstrate active listening in sample interviews and observations.
- 5. Work collaboratively through the application of active listening skills and conflict resolution skills.
- 6. Describe, evaluate and demonstrate the components of empathy.
- 7. Differentiate between a person's (self or other) thoughts, feelings, and behaviours.

### 3. Required Materials

- (a) Textbook: *Interplay: The Process of Interpersonal Communication* by Adler, Rosenfeld, Proctor II, and Winder, 2016. 4<sup>th</sup> Canadian Edition. The e-book can be purchased through the Camosun bookstore.

### 4. Course Content and Schedule

Effective communication with others comes from a deep understanding of ourselves, an empathic understanding of others, and knowledge of the skills and methods for dealing with interpersonal situations. In this course, the students will work at developing self-awareness, study the theory of interpersonal relationships, and practice interpersonal skills in class and in their lives. The ability to implement communication theory into practice is the primary objective of this course. In order to accomplish this, students will complete readings from the text, participate in class discussions, and practice new skills in a series of structured exercises and assignments. Class attendance is very important for this course.

The class will meet online in Collaborate on Monday, Wednesday, and Friday mornings from 9:00am -10:40am.
