4. Identify and critically discuss contemporary issues affecting the structure and operations of the Canadian criminal justice (e.g. youth justice, female offenders and Aboriginal justice).

DESCRIPTION	WEIGHTING
Four short assignments , worth 4 points each. (Three points for content and 1 point for writing) You may choose between two topics offered for each assignment due. These short papers are 1 to 2 pages each. Research is not <i>required</i> but if references are used they must be cited.	16%
Two Exams (February 18 and April 12). Each in-class exam is worth 20%. The format may include multiple choice, short answer, fill in the chart, definitions and short essays	40%
Criminal Justice Process Synthesis.: You will “walk” a fictional offender through the criminal justice system from the point of arrest to the conclusion of sentencing, describing in detail the procedures, options and decisions made at each stage. Part I (Arrest to Bail Hearing) is due March 8 and Part II (Election to Sentencing) March 29. Content is valued at 28 points and writing at 10 points)	38%
Attendance and Participation: Up to three points will be awarded for attendance in class and up to three points for active participation in classroom discussions.	6%
