5. Basis of Student Assessment (Weighting)

Method: Classes will be lecture format with class discussions. Students will be expected to read the assigned chapter(s) and participate in class discussions.

Evaluation: Participation 10% - The material in the lectures and in the readings will be reinforced through active participation in classes and occasional written exercises.

Mid Term: 35%. Midterm to be done in class on **March 3, 2022** and will cover lectures up to and including February 17, 2022.

Final Exam: 35%. The format for the midterm and final exam may consist of definition, short answer, multiple choice, matching and essay questions.

Paper: 20% - You will be required to choose a law enforcement related topic: **Due March 24, 2022.**

Temporary Grade	Description
I	<i>Incomplete:</i> A temporary grade assigned when the requirements of a course have not yet been completed due to hardship or extenuating circumstances, such as illness or death in the family.
IP	<i>In progress:</i> A temporary grade assigned for courses that, due to design may require a further enrollment in the same course. No more than two IP grades will be assigned for the same course. <i>(For these courses a final grade will be assigned to either the 3rd course attempt or at the point of course completion.)</i>
CW	<i>Compulsory Withdrawal:</i> A temporary grade assigned by a Dean when an instructor, after documenting the prescriptive strategies applied and consulting with peers, deems that a student is unsafe to self or others and must be removed from the lab, practicum, worksite, or field placement.
