CALENDAR DESCRIPTION

Restricted to students in Dental Hygiene (subject to space availability and instructor approval; non-DHYG students may be permitted to register) Students will be introduced to microbiology with an emphasis on human oral health. Students will discuss biofilms in relation to health and disease. Students will learn about diseases of microbial origin that concern dental hygienists in order to illustrate the principles of pathogenesis, host-parasite interaction and modes of transmission. The relationship between microorganisms and infection control in a dental environment will be stressed.

COURSE LEARNING OUTCOMES / OBJECTIVES

Upon completion of this course a student will be able to:

1. Describe the basic principles of microbiology and the classification of microorganisms.
2. Describe the different classes of microorganisms.
3. Describe the formation of biofilms as they relate to dental hygiene practice.
4. Explain infection control and its significance in the dental environment.
5. Describe symbiotic and dysbiotic organisms in the oral microbiome.
6. Explain the role of specific oral microbiota in periodontal diseases and dental caries.
7. Discuss various diagnostic tests used to detect microorganisms involved in oral infections.

Students should download and bring a copy of the lecture notes to class so that they can follow along and add to the notes during the lecture. There may also be pre-readings recommended for the lecture. Lecture notes and any suggested pre-readings can be found on D2L > Contents > Lecture > Appropriate Week.

- **Presentation #1.** Each pair of students will research one bacterium of interest to dentistry and prepare a 5-10 min. Powerpoint presentation that they will deliver during the Bacterial Infections Conference lecture time. During the presentation, classmates will be taking notes. Once the presentation is over, classmates will have a few minutes to ask questions of the presenting pair.
- **Presentation #2.** Each pair of students will research one virus of interest to dentistry and prepare a 5-10 min. interactive presentation that they will deliver during the Viral Infections Conference lecture time. Since classmates will be expected to participate in this presentation and therefore may not have the chance to take notes, the presenting pair will also prepare a short summary to be compiled into table format. The presentation will be followed by a short 2-3 min. question period.

Lecture Attendance

Study Habits

Good and regular study habits are essential to do well in this course. You should plan on a weekly minimum of 6 hours outside of scheduled class time for the completion of readings, assignments and for general studying. Joining a study group can help make this more achievable. Lecture presentations will be uploaded to the course website. These should be used as a study guide, not as your sole source of information. You will need to write down additional key words for examples and explanations given during lecture and review text and videos to support your understanding. It is also recommended practice to transform lecture notes into a study-friendly format after each lecture, incorporating additional information from your textbook. Study these notes before the next class to prepare yourself for new material, which will often build on previously covered material. **Please take advantage of office hours if you need extra clarification and help.**
