This course examines some basic concepts in political science. - 3. Identify basic political actors: political parties, interest groups, social movements, and the news media.
- 4. Describe the relationship between politics and the economy, the value of democracy (in both the developed and developing nations), and the future of politics at the world level.
- 5. Critically evaluate some aspect of political life. (Topics may change from semester to semester, but could consist of such things as democracy, human rights, civil disobedience, social democracy, political radicalism, etc.)

D2L Reading Quizzes (RQ) 1.875% per quiz; 8 quizzes throughout the semester With each new chapter or reading students will be asked to take an online multiple-choice quiz in the course D2L website (in the Quiz section). The quizzes will cover the reading for that week (a chapter) and must be completed prior to the start of that week's class. Students have two attempts to successfully complete each RQ. The answers for each RQ are available once that RQ closes (1:00 PM Tuesday). The online submission window will close one hour prior to the start of that week's first class – 1:00 PM on Tuesdays. There will be nine reading quizzes throughout the semester. The lowest grade on one of the nine RQs will be dropped from the student's overall grade. At the start the semester, students will be asked to complete the Course Tour Bonus Quiz. This quiz will ask students about course syllabus, different assignments, collaborate, and other aspects of the course. The quiz will be worth up to .5%. The bonus marks will be added to the final grade of the course.		15%
Short Essays (SE): 25% per assignment; 3 shorts essays throughout the semester Students will write three short essays (SE) of approximately 300 words each; one short essay per module. A choice of questions will be posted at the beginning of each module. Students will answer one question from that module's selection. Short essays should be just as well-crafted as a standard essay. A rewrite option for either short essay one or short essay two will be available. Students can revise, rewrite, and resubmit one of those two essays by November 13 at 11:59 PM. Micro Project (MP): 3% per project; 3 projects over the semester In groups of two or three students, students will create a meme or short video (of approximately 30 seconds) that captures one of the themes identified for that section of Fifteen Dogs novel. Students will have one full class day ('Dog Days') to brainstorm and create their micro project. Students will submit an image formatted pdf or video link associated with their group to the MP Assignment folder. There will be three Dog Day Bonus Quiz (worth .5% each) prior to each Dog Day.
