COURSE GUIDELINES & EXPECTATIONS

Biology 252 is the first of two pathophysiology courses for students in the second year of the Bachelor of Science Nursing Program. The course initially focuses on foundational concepts of pathophysiology that define dysfunction of the major organ systems and then proceeds to examine specific diseases within the cardiovascular, endocrine and nervous systems of the human body. The objective is to enable students to apply theoretical knowledge to nursing practice. While the course will cover diagnosis and medical management of diseases studied, protocols related to nursing care and nursing management will be covered in nursing courses.

Tests and examinations must be written at the scheduled time unless there is a documented medical or other emergency that prevents you from doing so. In this case, you must notify the Instructor (not someone in Nursing) BEFORE the examination and submit a doctor's note that indicates the doctor's evaluation of why you were unable to write the examination. A note simply stating that you were unwell or unable to write an examination will not suffice (personal, confidential information is not required). Minor ailments are not considered valid excuses. A doctor's note is not required for COVID related illness, but it is still necessary to inform the Instructor of your inability to write a scheduled exam. Your attention is specifically drawn to Camosun's examination policy which states that examinations must be written at the scheduled time except in case of an emergency. Examinations will NOT be deferred for vacations or pre-booked flights. Examinations cannot be written before the scheduled dates or times.

Some examination questions will require return of factual information. Others will involve interpretation, assimilation and application of information often based on clinical scenarios. You can practice working through clinical scenarios by referring to your textbooks and their accompanying student resources. Interpretation, assimilation and application of information are repeatedly undertaken in class discussions. **Attend classes regularly and pay attention to class discussions. Repeated absences from class and reliance on notes obtained from peers will compromise success in the course.** Integral to this course is the ability to demonstrate in exams the use of correct scientific/medical terminology with correct spelling. Knowledge of accepted medical abbreviations is also required. For the latter, some exam questions will use medical abbreviations and your

answers will have to be written without the use of abbreviations. A penalty will be applied for incorrect spelling and use of abbreviations in answers to exam questions.

Writing examinations, completing all quizzes and other required tasks is compulsory.

Prior understanding of the physiology and associated anatomy of the organ systems being studied is essential, as this forms the basis for studying pathophysiology. Students are recommended to review relevant Anatomy and Physiology concepts on their own prior to commencement of lectures on the appropriate organ system.

Course content is made available via several sources including online PPTs to support the upcoming lectures, textbooks, and other websites/video links. Many of these sources complement each other and you will have a stronger understanding if you diversify your use of these tools. This course outline lists all topics that will be studied. You are encouraged to review each topic in the textbook before class and to consolidate information obtained in lectures with that in the textbook after each class.

This course is both content and concept driven, with a large volume of new information to process. In addition, the course involves skills related to clinical information that some may not be adequately experienced in e.g. critical thinking, problem solving, assimilating and applying information, and working with clinical scenarios. Since these skills develop with practice over time, applying them regularly to course content is important. Engaging with the Instructor during class time by asking questions, forming study groups and discussions with your peers and utilizing your textbook are good resources for developing these skills. Refer to the online student resources accompanying the books.

According to college policy, students may not use recording devices without prior written permission from the Instructor. When the use of a recording device is sanctioned by the College's Centre for Assisted Learning in order to accommodate a student's learning challenge, the Instructor must be provided with an Instructor notification letter from the Centre for Assisted Learning that specifies the use of a recording device and a recording agreement (see Instructor for this) has to be accepted by the student regarding the following. Recordings made in class are strictly for the student's personal use only, and distribution of recorded material in any form or any forum is prohibited. All recorded materials must be permanently deleted/destroyed at the latest on the day final grades for the course are posted.

You are encouraged to consult the Instructor if you require assistance with course material. It is important to be reminded that the responsibility lies with students to source out and utilize resources that best suit their study needs in order to achieve their learning goals.

Ensure that you have the necessary prerequisites for Biol 252 and that you are enrolled in all co-requisite courses. Any student not enrolled in a full nursing course load for the current semester MUST inform the Instructor of this by September 18th. Note that Biol 153 is a prerequisite for BIOL 252 while NURS 232, NURS 260 and NURS 280 are co-requisites. These requirements are checked, and any student enrolled without them will likely be de-registered from the course if formal transfer credit or co-requisite waiver was not obtained.
