CALENDAR DESCRIPTION

This is an introductory course for students with little or no knowledge of Spanish. Students develop basic proficiency in oral expression, listening comprehension, reading, writing, and acquire a fundamental knowledge of grammar and vocabulary. Emphasis is on oral communication. Notes: Native speakers of Spanish or students with Spanish 12 may not enroll.

<u>Campus Difusión</u>– (15% of final grade)

Students are expected to complete online activities regularly (see due dates above). These exercises are found on Campus Difusión (www.campus.difusion.com), the website that accompanies our textbook.

** ilmportante! ** You will need this code: CG9KJERV to sign up in this particular Camosun class within Campus Difusión. Otherwise, I won't be able to see your online work or mark your progress.

Your grade for the Campus Difusión portion of the course will be based on timeliness (did you finish all the activities by the due date?) and effort to improve (are you getting the hang of these concepts?), rather than the percentage grade the website assigns you. I need to see sincere and careful work that is submitted in full and on time for top marks for this portion of your final grade. Completing these exercises on time allows you to fully participate in the course and be prepared to practice speaking when you come to class.

<u>Listening assessments (5)</u> – (25% of final grade)

Each chapter includes a listening quiz that consists of two parts:

- 1. <u>Dictation</u>: The instructor will read questions aloud and ask students to write down what they hear and then answer the questions in writing. Students have access to this list of questions in advance on D2L.
- 2. <u>Textbook audio recordings and videos</u>: During the assessment, students will listen to audio tracks and/or view videos and answer written comprehension questions. Students have access to most recordings and videos prior to the exams and are encouraged to practice with them frequently.

Mini-presentations (2) – (10% of final grade)

On two occasions during the semester, students will give a short oral presentation to a small group of classmates and answer several questions. This process will then be repeated two or three additional times that day in order to improve oral skills. Students will need to submit an outline of these presentations for full marks. Please read the warning below concerning the use of online translators or help from proficient Spanish speakers when writing these presentations, as this constitutes academic dishonesty.

Chapter tests (3) – (40% of final grade)

Students will complete 3 written tests.

Test A (chapters 1 and 2)
Test B (chapters 3 and 4)
Test C (chapter 5 and several previous concepts)

Final video (1) – (10% of final grade)

This video is your chance to verbally showcase all you have learned during the semester. It can be done individually, in pairs or in groups. Toward the end of the term, I will share the exact requirements for the video but you can expect to compile situations we practice in the classroom into a final project that demonstrates your speaking mastery of all the areas covered in the course. All your work in the course will prepare you for making this video and it does not require you to learn new concepts or look up new words or phrases; rather it is a summary project (in Spanish) of all the things you can talk about after completing SPAN 100. Please read the warning below concerning the use of online translators or help from proficient Spanish speakers to complete this project, as this constitutes academic dishonesty.

COURSE GUIDELINES & EXPECTATIONS

¡Bienvenidos a SPAN 100! Intended for true beginners, Spanish 100 is an introductory course designed to be followed by Spanish 101. During this term, we will cover chapters 1-5 of your textbook, *Aula Internacional Plus* 1. You will learn basic terminology related to many daily life interactions such as meeting new people, university and work life, family and home life, socializing, shopping, past-times, and travel-related vocabulary.

In this course, students will also gain an introductory knowledge of some of the diverse cultures of the Spanish-speaking world through exposure to music, texts and video-clips.

This course is university transferrable to other institutions and is equivalent to UVic's SPAN 100A (https://www.bctransferguide.ca/). If you choose to continue with Spanish 101 at Camosun in the future, you will then complete the remaining four chapters of your textbook. Following these two courses, students are generally at an A1 ("Breakthrough") level. This proficiency level is an internationally recognized milestone that you can use to indicate your level to other institutions all over the world. Attendance and your progress in the course:

Learning a new language requires self-discipline and a commitment to keeping up with the class. It is very difficult to catch up after falling behind in a language class and students are advised to attend all classes and keep up with the work day-by-day in order to make progress. If you don't understand something, please see me immediately! There is no mark for attendance and participation, however, students are unlikely to be successful in this course or to become proficient in the language without being present in class.

Illness, accident, family affliction and religious obligations are the only legitimate reasons to miss due dates for in-class assessments and presentations. If you are absent the day of such an activity, please contact me as soon as possible to make arrangements.

***MUY IMPORTANTE (please read):

WARNING: Online translators

¡Cuidado! (Careful!) You might be tempted to use Google Translate or other types of automatic electronic translators to prepare your oral presentations and final video. While these tools can usually give you the gist of what a sentence means, I have seen plenty of very wrong and sometimes embarrassing translations come out of these tools. They can be useful if you're in an emergency situation, but if your goal is to speak Spanish with competence and finesse, I guarantee that relying on these tools will not help you progress. Also, it's quite obvious when someone has used an online translator, dictionary, or even a native speaker to help write their work.

If you submit work using verb tenses we haven't studied yet or perhaps a lot of slang from a specific country, you will not receive credit for your work. If what you submit doesn't make sense and/or was clearly written by an online translator, you'll also receive a mark of 0. I'll teach you everything you need to know to be successful in this course, so no need to go searching for new verb tenses just yet. I've found that if students start using new tenses before they're taught all the parameters for how to use them correctly, they often create bad habits, so please just stick to the material we are working on in class. If you're really curious about a more advanced topic, just let me know and I'll be happy to teach it to you.

I know you all have amazing and profound things to say; however, this is a first semester beginner's Spanish class, so some of the things you want to say may have to wait. It's okay to look up a word here and there in a dictionary, just please don't have a proficient speaker write complete sentences for you and refrain from submitting any text produced by an online translator. ¡Gracias!
