CALENDAR DESCRIPTION

In this course students will learn the basics of music sequencing and applications of the digital audio workstation (DAW) through use of a variety of current music sequencing software. Skills gained will allow students to render moderately complex music from written notation into sounding music formats.

1. Work effectively with a basic digital audio workstation (DAW) in the rendering of electronically-generated music for use in personal portfolio development.
2. Produce moderately complex musical examples demonstrating effective music sequencing using software programs.
3. Discuss the attributes of a variety of music sequencing software programs in their application to professional and academic settings.
4. Discuss the attributes of and assemble a well-formed DAW in its application to professional and academic settings.
