COURSE GUIDELINES & EXPECTATIONS

Written Arguments

It takes time and practice to learn to read and write arguments, so there will be many short writing assignments. Assignments will be given and completed in class. Students will need their text book and pens and paper to complete assignments in the seminar. There will also be homework assignments to be completed outside of class time; these are to be handed in at the seminar the week after they are assigned.

Late assignments will not be accepted. Come and see me if you get behind. I will help you catch up while working with the examples the class is also working on at the time.

Collaborative Grading

Collaborative grading is a system whereby we will decide your grade together. I will provide feedback on the written assignments and return them each week (barring extenuating circumstances). Students will propose their grade using a grading rubric to be provided. Students are required to bring the completed rubric and their arguments to a short meeting with me where we will determine the grade.

A sign up sheet for a mid-term grade meeting between February 20th and March 10th will be circulated the week of February 13-17th. The second grade meeting will occur in the hours following the final exam. The date and time of the final exam will be posted by the College on February 17th. A sign up sheet will be circulated the last week of classes. Students who satisfactorily complete assignments yet fail to participate in this collaboration will receive a PASS only, i.e. 55% for this portion of their overall grade. Students who do not satisfactorily complete assignments and fail to participate in this collaboration will receive zero for this portion of their grade.
