Campus Difusión– (15% of final grade)

Prior to class, students are expected to complete online activities. These exercises are found on Campus Difusión (www.campus.difusion.com), the website that accompanies your textbook. Due dates for Campus Difusión activities will be listed in a daily D2L checklist.

Your mark for the Campus Difusión portion of the course will be based on timeliness (did you finish all the activities by the due date?) and effort to improve (are you getting the hang of these concepts?), rather than the percentage grade the website assigns you. I need to see sincere and careful work that is submitted in full and on time for top marks for this portion of your final grade. Completing these exercises on time allows you to fully participate in the course and be prepared to practice speaking during class.

Chapter tests (3) – (40% of final grade)

Students will complete three tests. In addition to written questions, each quiz contains a listening portion consisting of two parts:

1. Dictation: The instructor will read questions aloud and ask students to write down what they hear and then answer the questions in writing. Students have access to this list of questions in advance on D2L.
2. Textbook audio tracks: Students will listen to a track(s) from the textbook and answer comprehension questions about what they heard. Students have access to all recordings prior to the exams and are encouraged to practice with them frequently.

Lola Lago Listening Assignments (5) – (10% of final grade)

During the second half of the semester, students will read the novel, *Lola Lago, Vacaciones al sol* and do a variety of activities based on the book. Each week, students can expect to submit a listening assignment based on the assigned chapters.

Lola Lago Quizzes (2) – (15% of final grade)

Students answer reading comprehension questions and summarize audio tracks in two quizzes based on the *Lola Lago* novel. Meticulous work on the *Lola Lago* listening assignments explained above will aid students in preparing for these quizzes.

Presentations (2) – (10% of final grade)

On two occasions during the semester, students will give a short oral presentation to a small group of classmates and answer some questions orally. This process will then be repeated two or three additional times that day in order to improve oral skills. Students will need to submit an outline of these presentations for full marks. Please read the warning below concerning the use of online translators or help from proficient Spanish speakers to complete these projects.

Final video (1) – (10% of final grade)

This video is your chance to verbally showcase all you have learned during the semester. It can be done individually, in pairs or in groups. Toward the end of the term, I will share the exact requirements for the video but you can expect to compile situations we practice in the classroom into a final project that demonstrates your speaking mastery of all the areas covered in the course. All your work in the course will prepare you for making this video and it does not require you to learn new concepts or look up new words or phrases; rather it is a summary project (in Spanish) of all the things you can talk about after completing SPAN 101. Please read the warning below concerning the use of online translators or help from proficient Spanish speakers to complete this project.

COURSE GUIDELINES & EXPECTATIONS

Welcome to Spanish 101, the continuation of Spanish 100. In this term, students will strengthen skills learned in Spanish 100 and cover chapters 6-9 of the textbook, *Aula Internacional Plus 1*. Following this course, students are generally at an A1 (“Breakthrough”) level in the CEFR (Common European Framework of Reference for Languages). This course is university transferrable to other institutions and is equivalent to UVic’s SPAN 100B (<https://www.bctransferguide.ca/>).

In Spanish 101, students will continue learning terminology and communicative skills related to many daily life interactions including meals and eating out, daily routines, personal preferences, describing locations and people, asking for and providing directions, and speaking about past experiences. In this course, students will also build on their knowledge of some of the cultures of the Spanish-speaking world through exposure to a variety of media.

WARNING: Online translators and help from proficient Spanish speakers

¡Cuidado! (Careful!) You might be tempted to use Google Translate or other types of automatic electronic translators to prepare your oral presentations and final video. While these tools can usually give you the gist of what a sentence means, they also produce incorrect and bizarre translations as well. They can be useful if you’re in an emergency situation, but if your goal is to speak Spanish with competence and finesse, relying on these tools will not help you progress.

If the work you submit doesn’t make sense, is too advanced and/or was clearly written by an online translator, you’ll receive a mark of 0. Work that was written or edited by a proficient Spanish speaker will also not be accepted. This means that anything you submit should only include verb tenses and material we have specifically worked on in class that you have compiled alone.

I'll teach you everything you need to know to be successful in this course. It won't be necessary to search for new verb tenses just yet or learn them out of sequence from a proficient speaker. I've found that if students start using new tenses before they're taught all the parameters for how to use them correctly, they often create bad habits, so please just stick to the material we are working on in class. If you're really curious about a more advanced topic, just let me know and I'll be happy to teach it to you separately.

Guidelines for missed in-class assessments and assignment due dates:

Illness, accident, family affliction and religious obligations are the only legitimate reasons to miss in-class assessments and assignment due dates. If you are absent the day an assessment is given, please contact me as soon as possible.

Attendance:

Learning a new language requires self-discipline and a commitment to keeping up with the class. It is very difficult to catch up after falling behind in a language class and students are advised to keep up with the work day-by-day in order to make progress. **If you don't understand something or if you do fall behind, please see me immediately!**

There is no mark for attendance and participation, however, students are unlikely to be successful in this course or to become proficient in the language without being present in class.
