- 8.Describe the relationship between the field of abnormal psychology (psychopathology) and the Canadian legal and criminal justice systems.

COURSE GUIDELINES & EXPECTATIONS

LECTURE FORMAT:

This course will consist of lectures presented to you in PowerPoints during the scheduled lecture time. PowerPoint slides will be posted to D2L before class; however, additional content will be discussed in class.

Therefore, it is important that you attend each class, ask questions, and take further notes. Reading the supporting chapters in your textbook will help reinforce the content discussed in class.

EXAM FORMAT:

The exams may consist of multiple choice, true or false, and short answer questions. You must write the exams during the scheduled class time. You must inform me before an exam if you cannot write it at the scheduled time. A make-up exam will only be scheduled if you can provide documentation for your absence. The exams will not be cumulative. Exam 3 will take place during the final exam period.

MOCK PATIENT INTERVIEWS:

During the semester you will be introduced to three mock patients during seminar. Your task will be to ask these 'patients' questions to determine the disorder(s) you think they are presenting with and to take notes. Before the start of the next class, you will send me a write up of your 'diagnosis' along with the symptoms presented by the mock patient that led you to that diagnosis. Each mock interview will count towards three percent of your final grade ($3 \times 3\% = 9\%$). Further details will be discussed in class.

SEMINAR ASSIGNMENTS:

There will be six seminar assignments required throughout the semester. Assignments will be provided to you at the start of a seminar and must be completed in class. Each seminar assignment will count towards two percent of your final grade ($6 \times 2\% = 12\%$). Further details will be discussed in class.

RESEARCH REPORT:

There is a research report required in this course. See the **Research Report PowerPoint** posted to D2L Content for full details and instructions.
