- 1. Recognize the standard systematic procedures used by Americanist archaeologists to investigate the past including site survey and excavation, artifact analysis, faunal analysis, mapping.
- 2. Discuss the nature of the archaeological evidence.
- 3. Identify and discuss basic theoretical approaches in archaeology at low level, middle range and high level.
- 4. Identify and discuss reasons for conservation and protection of archaeological sites and artifacts.
- 5. Critically evaluate professional and non-professional ideas and writings about prehistory.
- 6. Carry out descriptive analyses of certain types of artifacts.
- 7. Discuss divergent ideas of the past.
- 8. Outline the attitudes and concerns of aboriginal communities in regard to archaeological excavation, human skeletal remains and interpretation of North American prehistory.

DESCRIPTION	WEIGHTING
LABS Weekly labs are opportunities to apply concepts discussed in lectures. It is very important that you attend each lab as this is the only way to learn the material that you will be responsible for in the lab quizzes. Students earn 1% of the overall mark for completing activities in this lab time; sometimes labs are experiential where student participation earns a mark, but some labs have exercises to be handed in for marks and feedback.	15%
There will be a lab quiz on Friday, April 14, worth 8% of your final grade that will evaluate lab content from the semester, with a focus on skills-based material that is not tested in lecture exams.	

DESCRIPTION	WEIGHTING
EXPERIMENTAL ARCHAEOLOGY TERM PROJECT DUE by Sunday, April 9 at 11:59pm This semester students have the opportunity to supercharge their learning with an applied term project that combines experimental archaeology, Indigenous knowledge, and food archaeology. The objective is to learn about Middle Range Theory by connecting elements of the material record with less tangible (and more human) elements, like cultural protocols and values that structure decisions, priorities and relationships with the environment and with one another. In teams of 2, students will choose a topic from a list and design a small piece of research to explore some component related to food. The experiment must control for as many variables as possible to allow for the collection of data (both qualitative and quantifiable data) that will produce useful results. The initial project proposal will be pitched in class on Friday, 10. This proposal will be pitched to the class, Nicole and Jared, which gives student teams a chance to get valuable feedback to hone their projects. Teams will then refine their research proposal and submit it by February 24. This will include the start of the background section of the final report, and the methodology for the research. The proposal is worth 5%. Data for these experimental projects will be collected as part of a full day of land-based learning on Friday, March 24, when the class will travel to Jared's property in Cowichan. Students will help one another, learn together, and share a meal before returning to Victoria in the late afternoon. There is no additional cost for this fieldtrip, unless a team needs to purchase a few small items for their technology. Transportation will be provided by the college, and students will be gone from campus from 7am-4pm. NOTE: If there are students that cannot make a full day of applied learning fit into their school or work schedules, they can do a similar experimental project, either solo or in pairs, where data will be collected in town at a time that they set	WEIGHTING 30%

Exams: Exams must be written at the scheduled times. The only exception is extreme illness, in which case the instructor must be notified by phone or email BEFORE the day of the exam. Assignments: Please make sure that assignments are submitted properly via D2L instead of emailed to me. Things get misplaced very easily in my inbox, and it is harder for me to provide feedback and tie grades into the gradebook if files are not submitted through D2L. Please submit as a Word document of PDF, other formats often will not open for me.

It is important that assignments be submitted on time. **Five percent** of the total mark will be deducted for every day an assignment is late (yes, even weekends); while this may not seem like many marks, remember that 5% is the difference of a letter grade, and this adds up quickly. This is an unfortunate way to lose marks, and can be avoided by not procrastinating and staying organized in terms of time management. Unless there is a documented medical reason there will be no exceptions made.
