CALENDAR DESCRIPTION

Through a variety of projects, students will explore paint, pigment, colour and other related media. Students will learn about formal and informal structures in painting with a variety of materials like canvas, wood and paper, and tools such as brushes, knives, sponges and airbrushes.

- 2. Analyze and apply colour theory.
- 3. Demonstrate a variety of painting skills: naturalistic and representational, photographic and abstract.
- 4. Explore content such as the narrative, the symbolic, and the political.
- 5. Interpret and generate constructive and interculturally-aware critiques of one's own and others' projects.
- 6. Describe historical and contemporary references.

REQUIRED MATERIALS & RECOMMENDED PREPARATION / INFORMATION

Course Format: Please attend the in-person classes; ALL demos and activities will be face-to-face and hands on. You will also log on D2L for Course content, assignment submissions, and grading.

Summary of Expectations for Independent Painting Projects

Paint projects should enhance your learning about paint and images, the sources of your creativity and where and when your ideas come from experiment, practice, play and purpose can enhance your own creative thinking. Painting is the importance of the medium, the need to be in control of the medium, the need to play and take risks and the need for critical judgement.

As painters we will study colour: warm colours, cold colours, lights and darks, hue, tint, shade, tone, chroma, value, lights and darks intensity, brightness, colour deception, after images, colour mixing, harmony, colour relativity, memory, and develop an eye for color, in theory and practice.

- You will be required to submit 5 sketches of your planned painting projects and completing 5 Independent paintings during this course. Each working day in class will include time for sketching, painting, and discussing ideas with your classmates and instructor.
- You are also required to write up an **Artist's Statement** for each independent painting; these will include describing your inspiration and the message you intend with your work.
- Independent paintings when complete will be reviewed by your instructor and fellow students during **in-class critique sessions**.

Tools & Supplies Required for this Painting Course

You need to purchase* the following tools and supplies.

• A 9"x11"Sketchbook. You will need this on the first day and will use it every day. You will also need your sketchbook to take handwritten notes during the in-class critiques, capturing your ideas for paint projects, and for developing your Artist's Statements for each painting project.

Sketch books are viewed by the instructor every in-class painting day.

YOU WILL NEED TO KNOW YOUR BUDGET for the remainder of the required supplies list. We recommend that you wait until AFTER the first class to make the following purchases; you will learn more about recommendations for these tools in your first class:

- Paint brushes for acrylic paint and gouache,
- watercolors and watercolour brushes,
- a flower palette or a stay-wet palette,
- plastic containers for mixing grounds and gesso

Note: Due to allergies, latex paint cannot be used in the paint studio
