All assignments must be typed and double-spaced, with a cover page that includes the course name, title (reflecting subject), your name, and date (see APA guidelines).

Evaluation of participation includes:

- Constructive and appropriate comments in class
- Participation in in-class assignments and exercises
- Active and appropriate participation in class discussions and group work
- Active and respectful listening
- Respectful and considerate behavior toward others

LATE POLICY

In exceptional circumstances, students may arrange with the instructor for an extension of an assignment **before** the due date. A professional's note will be required.

All assignments are to be submitted in hardcopy to the instructor by the start of class on the due date. In fairness to all students, late assignments will be deducted 5% per day after the first five minutes of class. If you anticipate a late arrival to class, ensure you have emailed an electronic copy of the assignment to the instructor to meet the deadline and avoid a deduction for lateness (bring the hardcopy as soon as possible).
