### Health History

### Dental Assessment

- Consistently identifies dental conditions during radiographic interpretation and documents information on the dental chart.

### Occlusal Assessment

### Dental Radiographs

- Consistently demonstrates and applies knowledge about radiographic theory, technique and interpretation from DHYG 260,261 at a competent (entry to practice) level

- Collaborates with the dentist and identifies when radiographs are required for caries detection or periodontal assessment

#### *Impressions*

 Demonstrates technique for acquiring a satisfactory impression of the maxillary and mandibular arches if required

### Study Models

 Demonstrates the fabrication of casts effectively and efficiently following laboratory guidelines if required

### Suture Removal

Effectively removes sutures and documents appropriately if required

### Periodontal Dressing

 Discusses and demonstrates procedures and post operative instructions for periodontal placement and removal if required

### Temporary Restorations

Places competent temporary restoration if required

### **Dental Imaging**

 Demonstrates adequate techniques and produces dental photographs as needed, using proper infection control procedures

### Diagnostic Testing

 Performs a variety of tests used to determine the health of the pulp (ice, percussion, heat, electric vitality testing) if required

# Learning outcome #7: Develop dental hygiene diagnosis and formulate care plan, which contributes to optimal oral and general health

### Dental Hygiene Health Care Planning

- Consistently demonstrates knowledge, skills and attitude learned in DHYG 160,161,162,260,261 at a competent (entry to practice) level
- Identifies the need for referrals when necessary
- Plans dental hygiene care to improve all client's oral health as well as meets the client's expressed wants, needs and expectations
- Consistently sets realistic time frames for all procedures
- Follows the plan during dental hygiene health care, evaluates (re-assess) it and modifies if required
- Discusses impact on dental insurance on care planning
- Discusses care planning in private practice

### Learning Outcome #8: Implement the dental hygiene process of care that contributes to the client's oral and general health

In addition to the performance indicators included in each subject heading, the student must also be able to successfully demonstrate the following performance indicators that are consistent in all the procedures

- Verbalizes an understanding of the rationale for each procedure
- Internalizes and demonstrates an efficient sequence and technique to ensure an accurate and thorough implementation of clinical procedures.
- Follows principles of infection control
- Identifies associated structures and anatomical landmarks to ensure proper implementation of clinical procedures
- Uses appropriate resources to facilitate maximum efficiency and accuracy
- Documents findings and all associated data accurately, legibly, and logically
- Problem-solves difficulties encountered during the implementation phase, and modifies as needed
- Adapts delivery of care when modifications are required for clients with compromised mobility and other special needs

#### Self-care

- Consistently demonstrates knowledge, skills and attitudes learned in DHYG 160,161,162,260,261 at a competent (entry to practice) level
- Based on assessment findings, develops and implements a comprehensive individualized self care plan

### Debridement

- Consistently demonstrates knowledge, skills and attitude learned in DHYG 160,161,162.260,261 at a competent (entry to practice) level
- Consistently problem solve difficulties with debridement including client acceptance, instrument selection and use, and pain control
- Consistently demonstrates ability to assess end point of debridement based on tissue response if applicable
- · Consistently utilizes pain management during debridement

- Consistently demonstrates safe and effective instrumentation with no soft tissue trauma, following sound principles of instrumentation
- Implements strategies to maximize the efficiency of debridement strokes
- Recontours and marginates restorations as needed ensuring original morphology/contour of tooth is reproduced or maintained and that the restoration is now cleansable

### **Polishing**

 Consistently demonstrate knowledge, skills and attitude learned in DHYG 160,161,162, 260, 261 at a competent (entry to practice) level

#### **Fluorides**

### Emergency Care

# Learning outcomes # 11: Evaluate the dental hygiene process of care to ensure safety, comfort and understanding

- Consistently demonstrates knowledge, skills and attitude learned in DHYG 160,161,162,260, 261 at a competent (entry to practice) level
- Discusses expected outcomes for dental hygiene interventions planned for each client
- Discusses the meaning of "supervised neglect" and its impact on dental hygiene care in private practice settings
- Consistently demonstrates ability to establish short term and long term goals for improving client knowledge and oral health
- Consistently recommends a continuing care interval to the client rationalizing the time span
- Consistently compares original and re-assessment data, analyzing client's current oral health needs
- Consistently evaluates the expected outcomes against actual outcomes to determine the success of dental hygiene care
- Provides information that should be explained to the client regarding a recommended referral
- Consistently demonstrates ability to recognize need for referral and follows appropriate referral proceedures
- Consistently records specific areas that must be monitored by the hygienist at the next continuing care appointment

### Learning outcome #12: Manage clinical environment to ensure optimal delivery of care

### Dental Records

- Discusses record keeping in private practice settings

### Inventory Control

- Discusses inventory control in private practice settings

### Appointment Scheduling

- Consistently problem solves difficulties with booking dental hygiene appointments or managing broken appointments
- Discusses appointment scheduling for private practice settings

### Accounts Receivable

- Collects all fees from clients
- Utilizes strategies to collect overdue accounts
- Discusses dental insurance

### Continuing Care Systems

- Consistently sets appropriate continuing care intervals for clients

- Identifies behavioral, biological, dental and professional rationale for dental hygiene procedures
- Relates basic theoretical knowledge to the application and the provision of dental hygiene care

### 5. Basis of Student Assessment (Weighting)

Clinical:

Students will be evaluated in each clinical session. Evaluating students in an authentic environment presents challenges in that each client is different and therefore no two experiences are identical. However, the benefits of authentic evaluation i.e. learning in a "real work environment" far outweigh the challenges by providing students with a range of experiences similar to the variety of clients a hygienist would see in a clinical setting.

Students will receive feedback on their performance in each clinical session. It is expected that students will apply feedback to improving their performance. Repeated feedback concerning difficulties in student performance indicates that the student is not progressing satisfactorily. **Students must have clients in a minimum of 95% of clinical sessions** 

All outcomes must be met satisfactorily to complete the course.

In addition the student must:

- 1. Competently complete 15 radiographs with a variety of different exposures
- 2. Complete 20 local anesthetic injections. Note: a minimum of 10 injections must be completely at a competent level with no guidance. If student performance is inconsistent, the student may be required to complete additional injections to demonstrate competence.
- 3. Competently complete 18 adults (1 light test client, 2 moderate test clients), a quadrant on a client with a difficult classification, a minimum of two simulation clients and 4 children (1 preschool child, 3 school ages) see specific guidelines on client graduation requirements form (pink)
- 4. Complete the documentation for all clients (including letters to the dentist) before requirements are considered complete.
