| Temporary Grade | Description |

8. COURSE ELEMENTS

1. Understand the skill set of a dental hygienist (beyond technical competence)

- a. Understand and identify sources of professional information that will assist you in your professional decision-making. Learn to critically appraise evidence for validity and usefulness.
- b. Discuss teamwork and collaboration in dental hygiene practice, including the understanding of team roles and conflict resolution.
- c. Understand the elements of communication and the skills necessary for optimal delivery of care.
- d. Examine skills for creating a supportive environment.
- e. Discuss teaching and learning approaches for encouraging compliance.
- f. Discuss the influence of culture on communication.
- g. Learn the elements of proper presentation skills with individuals and groups.

2. Discuss strategies for systematic inquiry to validate or improve dental hygiene services and assess professional and scientific literature relevant to dental hygiene practice

- a. Describe contemporary research topics and various types of professional reports.
- b. Identify various research designs and describe the scientific research process
- c. Discuss use of technology to access information, in consideration of research ethics, copyright guidelines and approval
- d. Examine parts of a journal article (abstract, introduction, review of existing research, purpose of the research, methods, findings, analysis/discussion of the findings, recommendations for dental hygiene practice, recommendations for future research)
- e. Discuss sources of support available for dental health research
- f. Describe the role of individual dental hygienists in oral health research

3. Describe partnerships between population groups and health professionals

- a. Identify partnerships with other health professionals.
- b. Examine the elements necessary for a successful partnership
- c. Recall the principles of health promotion and the five actions as outlined by WHO.
- d. Apply a collaborative approach when working in partnerships with community agencies.

4. Describe the role of dental specialists in relation to dental hygiene practice

- a. Describe common procedures that a general dentist might perform within the following disciplines, restorative dentistry, paediatric dentisty, oral surgery, periodontics, prosthodontics, endodontics, orthodontics, etc.
- b. Describe the common tools and materials used within the above disciplines
- c. Examine the role of the specialist in each of the disciplines
- d. Discuss the interaction of the various dental procedures and dental hygiene care

5. Discuss the role of the dental hygienist as an advocate.

- a. Discuss factors that create influence and change for and in others.
- b. Discuss the participation of dental hygienists in health initiatives, including the recent history of dental hygiene involvement in health initiatives
- c. Explore personal barriers to oral health, such as level of control and dental-related fear and anxiety.
