2. Course Description and Particulars

This course builds on concepts of health promotion and the determinants of health introduced in DHYG 245. Epidemiological concepts and trends are explored in relation to the oral health of various groups. The emphasis is on community oral health issues. Theory and concepts will be applied in the community.

 - describe the purpose and methodology of periodontal indices
 - describe the purpose and methodology of fluorosis indices

- describe the relationship between host, agent and environment
 - describe the impact of lifestyle practices and the social determinants of health on oral health
 - describe the estimates of the level of the oral health of Canadians
- 5.0 Describe research methodologies related to community oral health.
