2. Course Description & Intended Learning Outcomes

This course introduces the learner to the profession of dental hygiene. Current concepts of practice are examined, with an emphasis on roles, responsibility, and accountability of the dental hygienist within the profession of dental hygiene, the healthcare system, and professional organizations. Medical, legal, ethical principles, laws and practice standards are explored. Concepts related to health promotion, population health and determinants of health as they apply to role of the dental hygienist are discussed.

Upon successful completion of this course a student will be able to:

- 2. describe the discipline of dental hygiene, including roles and responsibilities within the health care system.
- 3. describe dental professional organizations, relevant legal considerations and current practice standards for the dental hygiene profession.

- 5. discuss the role of the dental hygienist in health promotion, population health and determinants of health.

Temporary Grade	Description
