- Compare and contrast qualitative and quantitative research methods including mixed methods
- Distinguish between primary and secondary research, deductive and inductive reasoning, and differentiate between basic and applied research
- Define sampling and differentiate between a population and sample
 - Distinguish between simple random, systematic stratified, cluster sampling, convenience sampling, and cohort sampling techniques
- 2. Explain the principles of evidence-informed practice and apply these to dental hygiene practice.
 - Explain the goals of research
 - Define evidence-based practice
 - Identify various ways of knowing and note their limitations
 - Explain why decolonization is necessary for learning about Indigenous knowledge systems and ways of knowing
- 3. Employ the process of obtaining evidence-informed research as it relates to dental hygiene.
 - Identify and describe research strategies for systematic inquiry related to evidence based dental hygiene services
 - Locate appropriate literature and evaluate sources of information
 - Explore medical/dental data bases and search strategies
 - o Discuss indexing in Medline

 - Describe contemporary research topics and various types of professional reports
 - Discuss sources of support available for dental health research
