COURSE DESCRIPTION:

This course is designed to build upon the knowledge and skills developed in the ELC Diploma Program. Students will critically examine all aspects of creating a responsive, inclusive caring and learning environment. Major focus will be on advanced skills in observation, evaluation and individual programming for <u>all</u> children within an inclusive ELC setting. Students must have access to an Early Childhood Licensed Group Care Centre.

COURSE LEARNING OUTCOMES:

Upon completion of this course, the student will be able to:

- 1. Identify historical perspectives, personal attitudes, values and biases towards people with diverse abilities and inclusive child care.
- 2. Apply developmental theory and the principles of practice of inclusive care to meet children's individual needs within the early learning and care settings.
- 3. Demonstrate how the inclusive, caring and learning environment supports and promotes the growth and development of <u>all</u> young children.
- 4. Reflectively critique own learning

- 5. Students must complete work in all areas to be eligible for a final grade for the semester.

ATTENDANCE:

Due to the short and intense nature of this ELC Diploma course, classes are planned as a continuum for building the skills and knowledge required. Classroom experiences and participation are a major part of competency development; therefore, consistent attendance is expected. Students are required to <u>contact the instructor in advance</u> if they are unable to attend class. Students who miss class are responsible for material and assignments *covered in class*. Repeated absence from class will be discussed with the student, and will affect a final grade.
