> ELC 110 Developmental Perspectives I Winter 2013

COURSE OUTLINE

Course Description

This course examines developmental theories that explain human growth from conception to early childhood. Current research from a developmental perspective is explored. The image of the child in society and the influence of family and culture on children's growth are examined. Application of theoretical knowledge to early childhood practice is emphasized.

2. Intended Learning Outcomes

- 1. Describe theoretical perspectives that explain children's growth and development.
- 2. Describe research in the area of children's development.
- 3. Apply theoretical knowledge to think about children's growth and learning.

4. Course Presentation

This course will be taught through reading, discussions and lecture. Through engagement with peers, on-line resources, the readings and the instructor students will critically examine developmental theories.

ASSIGNMENTS:

- 1. Class presentations of the readings
- 2. Observations of children's behaviors
- 3. Article Analysis Paper

A detailed explanation of assignments, their due dates and percentage values will be handed out and discussed in class.

Assignments are to be handed in on due date unless advance arrangements have been made with the instructor or marks may be deducted.

ATTENDANCE:

Due to the short and intense nature of the ELC program, classes are planned as a continuum for building the skill and knowledge required. Classroom experiences and participation are a major part of that competency development; therefore, **consistent attendance is expected**. Students are required to contact the instructor in advance if they are unable to attend class. Students who miss class are responsible for the material and assignments covered in class. Repeated absences from classes will affect a final grade.

Students who are absent for a presentation must make arrangements to make up the presentation within one week or it will result in a '0' mark.

PARTICIPATION:

Participation is important. There will be opportunities to participate in small groups, the large group and in your folders. You should pay attention and be willing to add ideas and questions to a discussion. As each of you will present for discussion from the text and other materials to be discussed you must help each other by listening carefully and thoughtfully and join in the discussion that they initiate.

All reading assignments must be completed to have a full grasp of the subject.

For one assignment you will need to be able to observe an infant or a toddler. This can be a child you know or a child in your practicum setting. Please note that if you are observing in an early learning program and you have not already done so. You will probably need to go through a criminal record check. The agency can assist you in filling out the forms.

Please double-space all assignments. Include a title page.

You will also be presenting in class for 15% (you will sign up for a time) As well as on-going writing in folders and class participation for 20% **NOTE:** It's the responsibility of the student to understand about the assignments before submitting by the due date. Rewrites are at the discretion of the instructor. Failed assignments may be re-submitted for a passing mark of C+. **Students will need a grade of 'C +' in this course to continue in the ELC Program at Camosun College.**
