This course examines the health, safety and nutritional needs of children. Emphasis is placed on the role and responsibilities of the educator in establishing and maintaining safe, nurturing environments for children in cooperation with families. Students learn how to develop health, safety and nutrition curriculum.

A detailed explanation of assignments, due dates and percentage value of your final grade will be handed out and discussed in class.

Note: All assignments are due at the beginning of the class on the dates specified <u>unless arrangements</u> <u>are made with the instructor at least 24 hours in advance</u>. Late assignments will result in a loss of marks – 3% per day.

Students who are absent for a class quiz must make arrangements with the instructor for a make-up quiz within 1 week of missing the test. Failure to make up the missed quiz or assignment results in a '0' mark.

<u>Note:</u> Students must complete all assignments to be eligible for a grade. Students who withdraw by the posted withdrawal date will not be penalized.

Withdrawal or incompletion of work after the posted withdrawal date will result in an 'F' grade being assigned.

Attendance

Due to the short and intense nature of the ELC program, classes are planned as a continuum for building the skills and knowledge required. Classroom experiences and participation are a major part of that competency development; therefore, consistent attendance is expected. Students are required to contact the instructor in advance if they are unable to attend class. Students who miss class are responsible for the material and assignments covered in class. Repeated absence from class can affect a final grade.

More than 3 missed classes could result in an 'F' grade. Students who miss three classes will be required to meet with the classroom instructor.

B. Temporary Grades

Temporary grades are assigned for specific circumstances and will convert to a final grade according to the grading scheme being used in the course. Temporary Grade	Description	
I	<i>Incomplete</i> : A temporary grade assigned when the requirements of a course have not yet been completed due to hardship or extenuating circumstances, such as illness or death in the family.	
IP	<i>In progress</i> : A temporary grade assigned for courses that are designed to have an anticipated enrollment that extends beyond one term. No more than two IP grades will be assigned for the same course.	
CW	CW Compulsory Withdrawal: A temporary grade assigned by a Dean when an instructor, after documenting the prescriptive strategies applied and consulting with peers, deems that a student is unsafe to self or others and must be removed from the lab, practicum, worksite, or field placement.
