COURSE OUTLINE

Description

This course introduces students to the knowledge, skills and dispositions of an early childhood educator. Emphasis is placed on developing responsive relationships with children. Students learn observation and recording techniques, with a focus on using positive language and a strength-based perspective.

Should students receive a mark of less than 50% on an assignment, they may request to rewrite and resubmit the assignment. Permission to resubmit an assignment is at the discretion of the instructor, rewritten assignments can receive a maximum grade of C+ (65%).
