Students will develop an advanced level of practice by integrating newly acquired knowledge and skills in acute, tertiary or community settings. Students will experience interprofessional collaboration

as they apply skills and knowledge to assessment, treatment, recovery, and change processes with individuals experiencing mental health and substance use challenges.

Upon successful completion of this course a student will be able to:

- a) demonstrate knowledge of the perspectives, values, and principles that inform leading practice and attitudes about mental health, substance use, and concurrent conditions.
- b) use a person-centered, strength and evidence-based approach as foundation for practice in community, health, and residential settings.
- c) apply comprehensive knowledge of mental health, substance use, and concurrent conditions in work with individuals, families, and groups.
- d) use critical thinking skills and evidence-based practice in the assessment, planning, intervention, and evaluation of person-centered support strategies and care.
- e) establish and maintain effective therapeutic relationships with individuals, groups, and families to facilitate change, recovery, and wellness in a collaborative and culturally respectful manner.
- f) work effectively in an interprofessional and collaborative care context with individuals, families, groups, agencies, and systems.
- g) practice responsibly and ethically, and demonstrate a commitment to personal and professional accountability.

B. Temporary Grades

Temporary grades are assigned for specific circumstances and will convert to a final grade according to the grading scheme being used in the course. Temporary Grade	Description
I	<i>Incomplete</i> : A temporary grade assigned when the requirements of a course have not yet been completed due to hardship or extenuating circumstances, such as illness or death in the family.
IP	<i>In progress</i> : A temporary grade assigned for courses that are designed to have an anticipated enrollment that extends beyond one term. No more than two IP grades will be assigned for the same course.
CW	<i>Compulsory Withdrawal</i> : A temporary grade assigned by a Dean when an instructor, after documenting the prescriptive strategies applied and consulting with peers, deems that a student is unsafe to self or others and must be removed from the lab, practicum, worksite, or field placement.
