Introduction:

In this course, students will produce a project that will be the crowning achievement, or "capstone" of their time in the Medical Radiography Program.

Students will have a multifaceted assignment that serves as a culminating academic and intellectual experience. The assignment may take a wide variety of forms, but most are long-term (occur over two semesters) investigative projects that culminate in a final product, presentation, or performance.

This project is designed to encourage students to think critically, solve challenging problems, and develop skills such as oral communication, public speaking, research skills, inter-professional interactions, media literacy, teamwork, planning, self-sufficiency, and goal setting.

2. Intended Learning Outcomes/Competencies

Upon successful completion of this course, students will be able to:

Your mentor must be willing to meet with you at least once to discuss your project plan.

Your mentor is not the evaluator of your performance in the course.
