2. Course Description & Intended Learning Outcomes

In this advanced beginner course, students complete an in-depth examination of the relational anatomy and physiology of the gastrointestinal, urinary, reproductive, neurologic, endocrine, and hematopoietic systems. Students enhance their understanding of anatomic relationships and physiologic functions using various medical imaging studies and a variety of illustrative media.

Upon successful completion of this course a student will be able to:

- a) interpret anatomical structures and relationships of the gastrointestinal, urinary, reproductive, neurologic, endocrine, and hematopoietic systems using multi-media including medical images.
- b) discuss the physiological function of the gastrointestinal, urinary, reproductive, neurologic, endocrine and hematopoietic systems as they pertain to the practice of medical imaging.
- c) compare and contrast the anatomic and physiologic information obtained by various medical imaging modalities.

Temporary Grade	Description	
I	Incomplete: A temporary grade assigned when the requirements of a course have not yet been completed due to hardship or extenuating circumstances, such as illness or death in the family.	
IP	<i>In progress</i> : A temporary grade assigned for courses that are designed to have an anticipated enrollment that extends beyond one term. No more than two IP grades will be assigned for the same course.	
CW	Compulsory Withdrawal: A temporary grade assigned by a Dean when an instructor, after documenting the prescriptive strategies applied and consulting with peers, deems that a student is unsafe to self or others and must be removed from the lab, practicum, worksite, or field placement.
