2. Course Description & Intended Learning Outcomes

In this advanced-beginner course, students explore three dimensional perspectives of the body using data from relevant medical imaging studies. Emphasis is placed on relating body planes to regional anatomy and correlating these to anatomic landmarks used for patient positioning. Students learn how sectional imaging is used in various medical imaging modalities.

Upon successful completion of this course a student will be able to:

- a) describe specific anatomic relationships between the axial plane, relational anatomy, and surface features of the body.
- compare and contrast normal, variant, and abnormal anatomic representations on sectional images.
- c) predict how anatomic features will appear on orthogonal images and multi-planar reconstructions.
- d) discuss the value and limitations of sectional imaging as it pertains to diagnosing disease and trauma.

Temporary Grade	Description
