5. Basis of Student Assessment (Weighting)

Evaluation: Exams and Assignments

There will be one psychomotor skills test, one midterm exam, and a final exam. Please be aware that the midterm exam may be scheduled outside of your regular class time, as this will allow all sections to write simultaneously. The final exam will be written in exam week.

The weighting for evaluation will be determined by nurse educators during the first week of class.

Missed psychomotor skills will result in an incomplete grade for the course. Students will be required to negotiate with their teachers to complete any missed Healing Workshop 4 skills prior to the final week of class. In addition, students will need to demonstrate the skill to the resource centre teacher prior to performing the skill in the practice setting.

All assignments must be completed to achieve a passing grade. There will be no extensions or rewrites of quizzes/assignments and exams.

B. Temporary Grades

Temporary Grade	Description
I	<i>Incomplete:</i> A temporary grade assigned when the requirements of a course have not yet been completed due to hardship or extenuating circumstances, such as illness or death in the family.
IP	<i>In progress:</i> A temporary grade assigned for courses that are designed to have an anticipated enrollment that extends beyond one term. No more than two IP grades will be assigned for the same course.
CW	<i>Compulsory Withdrawal:</i> A temporary grade assigned by a Dean when an instructor, after documenting the prescriptive strategies applied and consulting with peers, deems that a student is unsafe to self or others and must be removed from the lab, practicum, worksite, or field placement.
