# **COURSE OUTLINE**

### **Course Description**

This course is an introduction to the profession of nursing. Learners examine the standards of practice of the College of Registered Nurses' of British Columbia (CRNBC) and ethical perspectives in relation to nursing professional practice. Learners explore the history of the profession of nursing and critically reflect on the political and socioeconomic forces that have shaped the evolution of nursing as a profession.

Concepts and ideas introduced in this course of study provide a basis for future courses in the Professional Practice and other nursing course streams. Most important, this course will be foundational to the learners, nursing education and future nursing practice.

Temporary Grade	Description
I	<i>Incomplete</i> : A temporary grade assigned when the requirements of a course have not yet been completed due to hardship or extenuating circumstances, such as illness or death in the family.
IP	<i>In progress</i> : A temporary grade assigned for courses that are designed to have an anticipated enrollment that extends beyond one term. No more than two IP grades will be assigned for the same course.
CW	<i>Compulsory Withdrawal</i> : A temporary grade assigned by a Dean when an instructor, after documenting the prescriptive strategies applied and consulting with peers, deems that a student is unsafe to self or others and must be removed from the lab, practicum, worksite, or field placement.
