COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course will increase the learners understanding of pharmacology and medication administration across the lifespan. Medications used to treat diseases related to specific body systems is the main focus of the course. Also included are the topics of substance abuse and addiction.

LEARNING OUTCOMES

Upon completion of the course, the learner will be able to:

- Describe medication classifications, actions, interactions and nursing implications relative to body systems including: endocrine, neurological, cardiovascular, respiratory, gastrointestinal, genitourinary, musculoskeletal systems, and miscellaneous drug classification.
- 2. Relate drug interactions, polypharmacy, and food/drug effects to medication used by clients across the lifespan, particularly the older adult.
- 3. Describe the effects, uses, and indications for antimicrobials, as well as the relationship with drug resistance.
- 4. Relate theoretical understanding of narcotic side effects, indications for use, and legal responsibilities.
- 5. Describe the potential interaction of complementary, Indigenous and herbal preparations with prescription medications.
- 6. Demonstrate competency with mathematical drug calculations.
