2. Course Description & Intended Learning Outcomes

This course focuses on pathophysiology as it relates to the aging process and selected chronic illnesses. The main focus is on the care of older adults experiencing a health challenge. Cultural diversity in healing practices will be explored as well as evidence informed research and practice.

Upon successful completion of this course a student will be able to:

- a) explain the pathophysiology of common chronic illness related to the aging process.
- b) describe the nursing management of illness associated with aging
- c) identify altered presentations of illnesses in older adult clients.
- d) identify common mental health challenges and mental illness experienced by older adults (e.g., differences between normal aging and symptoms of a mental illness in older adults).
- e) give examples of diversity in traditional healing practices in management of chronic illness.
- f) describe how evidence informed practice impacts nursing care of older adults.

B. Temporary Grades

Temporary Grade	Description
I	Incomplete: A temporary grade assigned when the requirements of a course have not yet been completed due to hardship or extenuating circumstances, such as illness or death in the family.
IP	In progress: A temporary grade assigned for courses that are designed to have an anticipated enrollment that extends beyond one term. No more than two IP grades will be assigned for the same course.

CW

Compulsory Withdrawal: A temporary grade assigned by a Dean when an instructor, after documenting the prescriptive strategies applied and consulting with peers, deems that a student is unsafe to self or others and must be removed from the lab, practicum, worksite, or field placement.
