2. Course Description & Intended Learning Outcomes

This course integrates the concepts from previous professional practice courses and introduces learners to practice in the community. The role of the Practical Nurse as leader is emphasized in interactions with clients and their families, and other health care providers.

Upon successful completion of this course a student will be able to:

- a) compare and contrast how legislation, professional standards, code of ethics and practice expectations influences the continuum of care in community mental health care services.
- b) identify and explain professional self-regulation and the implication for individual responsibilities and accountability of the Practical Nurse in the continuum of care.
- c) explain and evaluate the influence of collaborative and inter-professional relationships on a quality practice environment.
- d) consider the roles of other health care providers in determining one's own professional and interprofessional roles.
- e) demonstrate the ability to access and assess current, relevant professional practice resources to prepare for nursing practice in community settings.
- f) explain the professional and legal responsibility of respecting cultural safety, diversity, and inclusivity in the community setting.

- g) apply and evaluate an ethical decision making process to ethical dilemmas in nursing practice of clients from across the lifespan in community settings.
- h) demonstrate self-reflection and reflective journal writing to enhance learning and nursing practice.
- i) explain the importance of self-care strategies for nurses.

B. Temporary Grades

Temporary Grade	Description
I	Incomplete: A temporary grade assigned when the requirements of a course have not yet been completed due to hardship or extenuating circumstances, such as illness or death in the family.
IP	<i>In progress</i> : A temporary grade assigned for courses that are designed to have an anticipated enrollment that extends beyond one term. No more than two IP grades will be assigned for the same course.
CW	Compulsory Withdrawal: A temporary grade assigned by a Dean when an instructor, after documenting the prescriptive strategies applied and consulting with peers, deems that a student is unsafe to self or others and must be removed from the lab, practicum, worksite, or field placement.
