# 2. Intended Learning Outcomes

This course provides an introduction to the profession of Practical Nursing (PN) and the philosophy and foundational concepts of the Provincial PN Program. Legislation that informs PN practice within British Columbia and the history of nursing, and specifically the evolution of Practical Nursing within the Canadian health care system, will be discussed.

Upon successful completion of this course a student will be able to:

- describe how legislation, professional standards, ethics, and practice expectations inform nursing practice.
- b) identify and discuss professional self-regulation and the implication for individual responsibilities and accountabilities of the Practical Nurse.
- c) explain the role and responsibility of the British Columbia College of Nursing Professionals (BCCNP).
- d) describe how the philosophy of caring guides nursing practice.
- e) describe how self-reflection and reflective journal writing enhances learning and nursing practice.
- f) cite some examples of self care strategies for the nurse.
- g) discuss the partnership of nursing (Registered Nursing, Registered Psychiatric Nursing, Licensed Practical Nursing).
- h) recognize and respect the diversity of other health care roles, responsibilities, and competencies.

- i) identify and explain the influence of interprofessional collaborative relationships on quality practice environments.
- j) demonstrate the ability to access and assess current and relevant scholarly resources to prepare for nursing practice.
- k) understand how cultural diversity, sensitivity and awareness influence professional practice.
- I) discuss ethical decision making principles through case studies.
- m) discuss theories of nursing leadership.
- n) identify key competencies associated with effective leadership, management and followership.

# **B.** Temporary Grades

Temporary Grade	Description
I	Incomplete: A temporary grade assigned when the requirements of a course have not yet been completed due to hardship or extenuating circumstances, such as illness or death in the family.
IP	In progress: A temporary grade assigned for courses that are designed to have an anticipated enrollment that extends beyond one term. No more than two IP grades will be assigned for the same course.
CW	Compulsory Withdrawal: A temporary grade assigned by a Dean when an instructor, after documenting the prescriptive strategies applied and consulting with peers, deems that a student is unsafe to self or others and must be removed from the lab, practicum, worksite, or field placement.
