

2. Intended Learning Outcomes

This course examines the legislation influencing PN practice with clients experiencing chronic illness and those in residential care settings. Specific professional issues such as responsibility, accountability, ethical practice, and leadership relevant to the PN role in residential care will be explored. Critical thinking and decision making specific to the care of clients with chronic health challenges and interprofessional practice are also addressed.

Upon successful completion of this course a student will be able to:

- a) explain how legislation, professional standards, ethics and practice expectations influences nursing practice in residential care.
- b) discuss professional self-regulation and the implication for individual responsibilities and accountabilities of the Practical Nurse in residential care.
- c) identify leadership responsibilities of the Practical Nurse when working with unregulated health care providers.
- d) define the nursing care delivery models used in health care
- e) describe the influence of interprofessional collaborative relationships on a quality practice environment in residential care.
- describe approaches to access others' skills and knowledge appropriately through consultation.
- g) demonstrate the ability to access and assess current, relevant, scholarly resources.

- discuss and explain professional responsibility with respect to the cultural diversity and inclusivity of clients, including cultural competency and trauma-informed care with aging populations.
- i) apply an ethical decision making process to determine actions for ethical dilemmas in nursing practice with clients experiencing chronic illness.
- j) demonstrate self-reflection and reflective journal writing to enhance learning and nursing practice.

B. Temporary Grades

Temporary grades are assigned for specific circumstances and will convert to a final grade according to the grading scheme being used in the course. Temporary Grade	Description
I	Incomplete: A temporary grade assigned when the requirements of a course have not yet been completed due to hardship or extenuating circumstances, such as illness or death in the family.
IP	<i>In progress</i> : A temporary grade assigned for courses that are designed to have an anticipated enrollment that extends beyond one term. No more than two IP grades will be assigned for the same course.
CW	Compulsory Withdrawal: A temporary grade assigned by a Dean when an instructor, after documenting the prescriptive strategies applied and consulting with peers, deems that a student is unsafe to self or others and must be removed from the lab, practicum, worksite, or field placement.

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
