2. Intended Learning Outcomes

This course builds on Pharmacology I to increase learners' understanding of pharmacotherapeutics prescribed for illnesses clients experience across the lifespan. Topics include drug classifications and links with common diseases/illness based on a body system approach and drug resistance.

Upon successful completion of this course a student will be able to:

- a) describe medication classifications, actions, interactions and nursing implications relative to body systems including: endocrine, neurological, cardiovascular, respiratory, gastrointestinal, genitourinary, musculoskeletal systems, and miscellaneous drug classification.
- b) relate drug interactions, polypharmacy, and food/drug effects to medication used by clients across the lifespan, particularly the older adult.
- c) describe the effects, uses, and indications for antimicrobials, as well as the relationship with drug resistance.
- d) relate theoretical understanding of narcotic side effects, indications for use, and legal responsibilities.
- e) describe the potential interaction of complementary, Indigenous and herbal preparations with prescription medications.
- f) demonstrate competency with mathematical drug calculations.
- g) consider the roles of other health care providers in determining one's own professional and Interprofessional roles related to complementary and prescription medication ordering, processing, dispensing, administration and monitoring.

5. Basis of Student Assessment (Weighting)

Math Exam -- based on drug dosage calculations, must achieve a 100% pass. Given 3 attempts to achieve 100% (different exam each attempt). (*Learning outcome #6*)

Note: Learners must achieve an 80% average overall on the theory portion of Pharmacology to pass PNUR 129.

B. Temporary Grades

Temporary Grade	Description
I	<i>Incomplete:</i> A temporary grade assigned when the requirements of a course have not yet been completed due to hardship or extenuating circumstances, such as illness or death in the family.
IP	<i>In progress:</i> A temporary grade assigned for courses that are designed to have an anticipated enrollment that extends beyond one term. No more than two IP grades will be assigned for the same course.
CW	<i>Compulsory Withdrawal:</i> A temporary grade assigned by a Dean when an instructor, after documenting the prescriptive strategies applied and consulting with peers, deems that a student is unsafe to self or others and must be removed from the lab, practicum, worksite, or field placement.
