2. Intended Learning Outcomes

This course provides learners with the foundational knowledge for caring and professional communication in nursing. An experiential and self-reflective approach is used to develop self-awareness and interpersonal communication skills in the context of safe, competent, and collaborative nursing practice. Topics include communication theory, the nurse-client relationship, therapeutic communication, cross-cultural communication, and effective teamwork.

Upon successful completion of this course a student will be able to:

a) describe fundamental elements involved in the communication process.

- b) demonstrate beginning awareness of self and understanding of self-concept.
- c) identify concepts and nursing actions that promote the development of therapeutic relationships.
- d) describe communication barriers to the development of therapeutic relationships.
- e) identify differences in multi-cultural communication as they relate to the nurse-client relationship.
- f) identify effective and culturally sensitive and aware communication strategies for First Nation, Inuit and Métis clients, their families and peers.
- g) describe how information and communication technology is used to support effective client care in collaboration with other members of the healthcare team.
- h) communicate roles, knowledge, skills, and attitudes using appropriate language.
- i) demonstrate giving and receiving feedback effectively.

B. Temporary Grades

Temporary Grade	Description	
I	<i>Incomplete</i> : A temporary grade assigned when the requirements of a course have not yet been completed due to hardship or extenuating circumstances, such as illness or death in the family.	
IP	<i>In progress</i> : A temporary grade assigned for courses that are designed to have an anticipated enrollment that extends beyond one term. No more than two IP grades will be assigned for the same course.	
CW	<i>Compulsory Withdrawal</i> : A temporary grade assigned by a Dean when an instructor, after documenting the prescriptive strategies applied and consulting with peers, deems that a student is unsafe to self or others and must be removed from the lab, practicum, worksite, or field placement.
