

2. Intended Learning Outcomes

This course focuses on pathophysiology and nursing care of clients across the lifespan experiencing acute disease and illness. Implications of the acute exacerbation of chronic illness will be addressed. Cultural diversity in healing practices will be explored as well as evidenced informed research and practice.

Upon successful completion of this course a student will be able to:

- a) explain pathophysiology as it relates to selected common acute illness of clients across the lifespan.
- b) explain the pathophysiology and nursing management of shock (cardiogenic, hypovolemic, neurogenic, anaphylactic, septic).

- recognise and explain the pathophysiology and nursing management of fluid and electrolyte imbalances.
- d) explain nursing management of common acute disease and acute exacerbations of acute illness of clients across the lifespan.
- e) identify holistic and traditional healing practices related to the acute illness experience.
- f) describe the impact of cultural diversity and cultural humility in health and healing.
- g) compare and contrast how different cultural practices impact health and healing.
- h) access relevant best practice information to support learning.

1	Introduction: Fluid, Electrolyte and Acid-Base Imbalances
2 & 3	Musculoskeletal System (osteomyelitis, bone tumours, amputations, fractures)
4 & 5	Cardiovascular System (myocardial infarction, atrial fibrillation, endocarditis, pericarditis and myocarditis)
6	Consolidation
7	Exam # 1
8 & 9	Respiratory System (SARS, chest trauma, pleural effusion, atelectasis, and pulmonary embolism)
10	Genitourinary System (acute renal failure, pylonephritis, glomerulonephritis, urolithiasis, kidney and bladder cancers)
11 & 12	Gastrointestinal System (inflammatory bowel syndrome (IBS), appendicitis, colorectal cancer, peptic ulcer disease and bowel obstructions)
13	Accessory Organs of Gastrointestinal System (cholecystitis, cholelithiasis, pancreatitis, liver cirrhosis, liver and pancreatic cancers and hepatitis)
14	Immune System (AIDS, HIV and emerging infections)
15	Consolidation
16	Exam # 2
17 & 18	Nervous System (increased intracranial pressure (ICP), head injuries, brain tumours and spinal cord injuries)

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19	Haematological System (to sickle cell anemia, hemolytic anemia, aplastic anemia, hemophilia, thrombocytopenia, lymphoma, multiple myeloma and acute/chronic leukemia)
20	Integumentary System: Burns
21	Shock Syndrome (cardiogenic, hypovolemic, neurogenic, anaphylactic and septic)
22	Consolidation

B. Temporary Grades

Temporary Grade	Description
I	Incomplete: A temporary grade assigned when the requirements of a course have not yet been completed due to hardship or extenuating circumstances, such as illness or death in the family.
IP	In progress: A temporary grade assigned for courses that are designed to have an anticipated enrollment that extends beyond one term. No more than two IP grades will be assigned for the same course.
